

Judge Directs Bell Verdict

Reverses Decision Made by Accident Commission

Directed verdict against the state accident commission was given in circuit court Wednesday afternoon by Judge R. Frank Peters at the close of an action brought by Harvey Bell to appeal from a decision of the commission.

Bell had been denied compensation for the loss of sight in one eye as the result of an accident while cutting wood for Z. J. Riggs of Hillsboro. Riggs was made intervenor by the commission. The verdict awards Bell the amount usually awarded for the loss of an eye and his expenses.

Appearing for Bell was Paul L. Patterson. U. R. Griggs represented the accident commission and W. C. Winslow, Riggs.

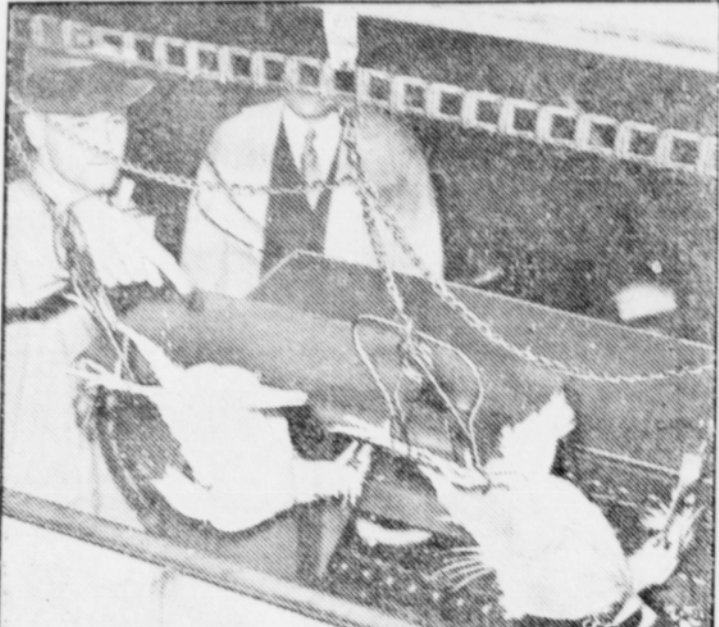

'Electric Chair' for Chickens



Seeking a more humane method of preparing poultry for market, two San Francisco technicians have developed an electric device to kill chickens, turkeys, geese and squabs. The picture above shows the new machine doing its job as an operator points out how the fowls, suspended from a moving belt, their legs pinioned in wire clamps, are killed as their heads are pressed against electrodes. The machines have from 1000 to 1500 volts, according to the size of the fowl to be killed.

Oliver Ricketts of Hillsboro paid \$25 and costs when A. W. Havens, justice, found him guilty Tuesday of shooting a gun from a highway.

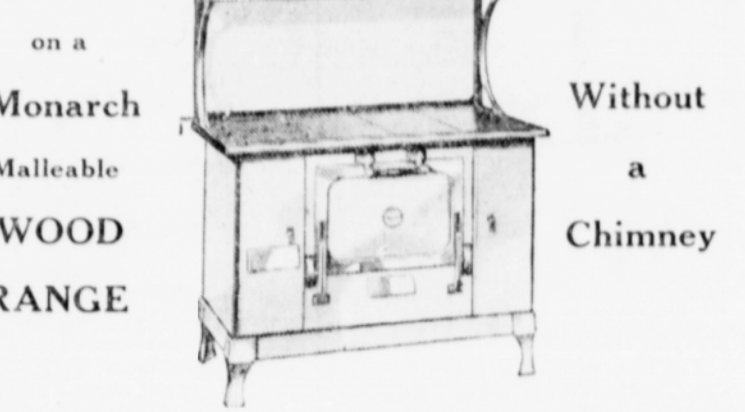
Ricketts was arrested Monday by State Policeman Jerry Cochran after a complaint was lodged by an irate landowner against Ricketts.

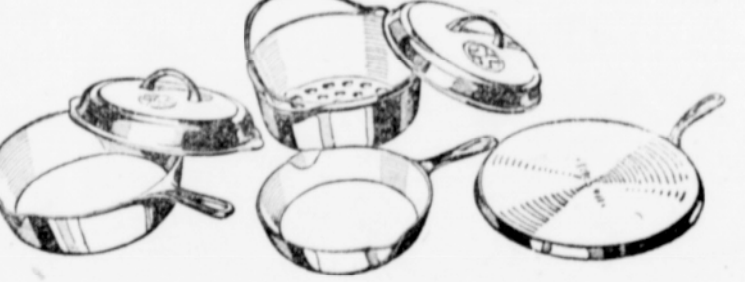
