One factor in the rapid comple tion of the new sewer lines, the contractors say, has been the dry weather both during the summer and this fall. At the disposal plant, a WPA

crew has constructed rock road-ways to the sludge beds and plant proper. The grading also has in-cluded considerable filling and leveling about the plant and ter-race below the road.
