One factor in the rapid completion of the new sewer lines, the contractors say, has been the dry weather both during the summer and this fall.

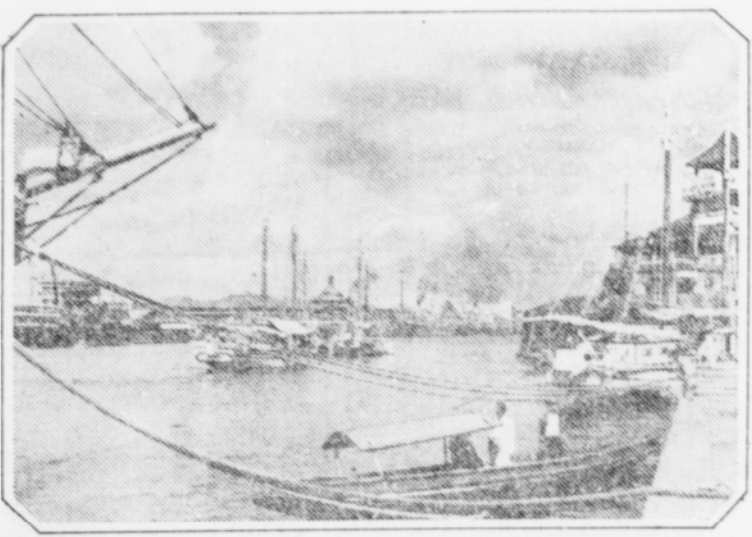
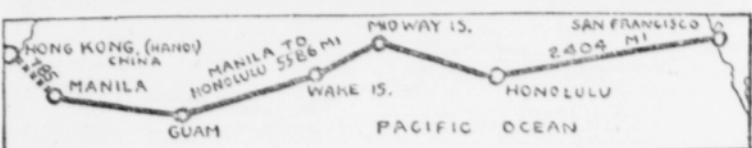
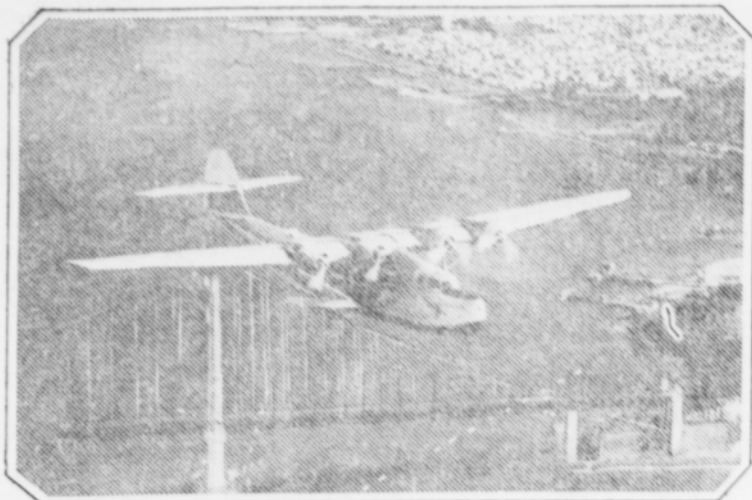
At the disposal plant, a WPA crew has constructed rock roadways to the sludge beds and plant proper. The grading also has included considerable filling and leveling about the plant and terrace below the road.

The property around the plant will be planted to grass and shrubs and otherwise beautified as time passes, McGee said.

Clipper Put on Regular Schedule



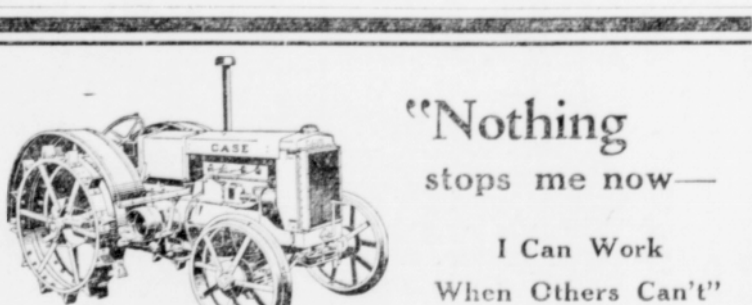
After more than 500,000 miles of successful experimentation in trans-Pacific airmail flights, Pan American Airways' three great Clipper ships are scheduled to begin regular passenger service Oct. 21 over the 8000-mile route from San Francisco to Manila. At top the China Clipper is shown over Golden Gate on one of its airmail voyages and below—the other end of the trail—is Manila harbor, where the old world and new now meet. ed to possess knowledge sufficient for leading a school health program. The schools about the state are not supervised by any definite health agency, except when the enforcement of state health laws is concerned. This is usually done by the city or county health board. In some counties and cities, advisory work is undertaken by visiting health nurses. This work, however, is loosely coordinated and omits some important factors of health and health education, such as mental health, dental hygiene and care, and supervision of seating, lighting and construction.

A good program of school health should include all the above. In other words the work of the health officer should go beyond the routine work of quarantine and sanitation inspection. The health program should be incorporated in the school curriculum, and a genuine cooperation between the health department and the school administration be made the basis of future policy. The health program should be under the supervision and direct responsibility of one definitely established health agency. This agency might well function under the State or County Board of Health.

Since health is such an important factor in all our lives, it is quite fitting that it be placed on at least an equal footing with other subjects taught in the public schools. Teachers should be prepared to teach health with the same thoroughness as other subjects. Health study could be integrated with the natural and social sciences, and applied to everyday problems so that it might be more interesting. While a campaign for better health education in the schools is at present the business of school administrations we must all do our bit towards publicizing the need

for a workable child health program.

Wet Brakes
