PEP Construction Exceeds 1936 Goal

Exceeding the 1936 rural electrification goal of 135 miles of new lines during the year, the Portland Electric company has already completed and is operating 100 miles of new rural lines, announces R. R. Easter, division manager.

Cost of this year's rural line construction will exceed \$100,000. "With 100 miles of new lines in operation, many more miles of line are under construction," Easter announced. Sufficient work is underway to keep crews busy for the next three or four months. The 1936 total should be well over the 135-mile mark.

"With the addition of the new lines, electric service is available to more than 85 per cent of all rural families living in the territory served by Peppo lines. This territory extends from Vancouver to The Dalles and from Estacada to Grand Ronde. This high availability is many times the national average of only 12 per cent of rural homes on power lines.

"It is interesting to note that, under the program, customers on a new line need guarantee payment for a monthly minimum for only five years. This compares with requirements for signing a guarantee for 20 years, the amortization period for lines built with rural electrification administration funds."
