

ing and business place, has been completed and records now are being compiled to show the amount of assessment which each property owner must pay each month.

The survey and work of making records is in the hands of Edwin Bowman, who has been hired by the city to care for the records and look after collections in connection with each residence.

When the survey was completed, it revealed that preliminary figures prepared by McGee for the purpose of estimating the income from the old district for retirement of the disposal plant debt were correct almost to a detail. Some twelve dwellings were found which had not complied with the ordinance and installed connections with the sewers.

In these instances the difficulty has been adjusted, it is said. Persons wishing to make connections will find it possible to get loans for the purpose of installing plumbing and making sewer connections, it is pointed out.

### Dedication Service Held at New Chapel

Dedication services conducted by Archbishop Edward D. Howard and attended by a number of the Portland clergy were held Sunday for the new \$30,000 sisters' chapel at St. Mary's of the Valley at Beaverton. The addition is to the south side of the present structure.

The chapel is 50 by 100 feet, seats 450 on the main floor and has a rear balcony to accommodate a new pipe organ and the choir. Construction began on March 19. The architecture is in Romanesque style, with a face brick exterior to match the main building. Ten large stained glass windows and 16 smaller ones include several taken from the old chapel and reconstructed.

Ceremonies included the blessing of the chapel, sermon by the archbishop and first public playing of the new pipe organ.

Five sisters who were present at the dedication of the first St. Mary's chapel attended at the ceremony Sunday, also Vicar-General Hildebrand of Oregon City and 28 priests.

Embroidered names of supporters throughout the county, a project of Mr. and Mrs. N. S. Nolan of Forest Grove, netted \$25 to the campaign fund and was awarded to Mrs. Anna Nault of Forest Grove. E. L. Ross, Richard G. Scott, Ray L. Antrim, George H. Beazan, M. K. Abraham and P. W. Lillison, democratic county candidates were introduced by E. E. McCluskey, who presided over the second half of the program, speaking for Bert Hagen, who was ill. Their three-minute talks followed a program which included harmonica solo by Dan Burkhalter with Mrs. Marguerite Dooher at the piano; a group of banjo numbers played by Wayne Nickeson, and a group of numbers by the Hillsboro Legion Auxiliary—Mrs. L. C. Krammen, Mrs. Chas. Helvie, Mrs. Fred Caldwell and Mrs. C. J. Crittenden, with Miss Mildred James as accompanist.

Twenty-two cakes were provided by women of the group, which were served with cream and coffee donated by committeemen. Considerable fun was injected into the proceedings when P. W. Lillison of Tigard auctioned six cakes, each bid a containing five cents for the privilege. Cake cash prizes won by Mrs. F. W. Nichol of Bethany, Mrs. Art Lisenby, of Glenwood, Miss Doris Nolan of Forest Grove and Mrs. H. H. Williams of Durham were turned into the campaign fund.
