

# Hilhi Eleven to Clash with Vernonia on Local Field Friday Afternoon at 2:45

## Locals Down Visitors 6 to 0

### St. Helens Plays Wide Open Game on Gridiron Here

Hilhi gridgers will clash with the strong, rugged Vernonia high eleven on the local gridiron tomorrow afternoon (Friday) with the kick-off scheduled for 2:45. Comparative scores indicate that the teams will be evenly matched and a real football battle is anticipated.

Hilhi's powerful gridiron running attack clicked but once for consistent gains against St. Helens here Friday afternoon, but that was just enough to eke out a narrow 6 to 0 victory over the daring, razzle-dazzle visiting eleven. A series of fumbles and fluky punts kept the Blue and White gridgers fighting in the shadow of their own goal during the first half and it was not until the second period that they were able to carry the battle to the invaders.

The locals got themselves into a hole almost at the start of the game when Right Half Sigler bobbed a punt at midfield and St. Helens' Right End Hamilton recovered on his own 48. A few plays and then the visitors punted to Sigler who was downed on his own 12. Sutherland got off a short wobbly punt for Hilhi and St. Helens had the ball on the Blue and White 36.

Again the Columbia county team ran a few plays, punted out of bounds on the 15 and then Fullback Ketchum fumbled on the first play to give St. Helens possession on the 12. From this point on Hilhi fought stubbornly with its back to the wall.

During the opening period Hilhi smashed down passing thrusts that seemed sure to bring a score. On two other occasions the Blue and White line stiffened to repulse the St. Helens running attack in scoring territory—once for

two downs, inches short of a first down on the two-yard stripe as Left Half McGlinn slashed furiously at the line.

Late in the half Wagner gave Hilhi its first breathing spell by intercepting a pass on his own 45 and running it back to midfield. After kicking to the St. Helens 25, Wagner again intercepted a pass, this time on the visitor's 40, and raced it goalward 19 yards. The half ended with Hilhi advancing the ball on St. Helens 14.

Hilhi's power smashes off tackle started to click near the middle of the third period and the locals sneaked a 56-yard drive from their own 15 to the St. Helens 21. Here a fumble on fourth down with inches to go for a first down momentarily held up the scoring drive.

St. Helens made but five yards on this series of downs, punted to Sigler at midfield and then the 50-yard march for a score was on. Two pass plays failed to connect as the drive started and then, on third down, Grogan passed to Jack for nine and a half yards. Wagner then cracked over right tackle for a first down with yards to spare on the St. Helens 35.

Wagner galloped seven yards as the quarter ended and then opened the final heat with a 12-yard run and a first down on the 16. The hard-driving Hilhi back fought his way for 15 1/2 yards in two plays to a first down on the six-inch line and then crashed over for a score, sprawling just over the line on his back under a welter of blue and yellow jerseys. Schulmerich's kick for the extra point was blocked.

St. Helens then launched a desperate attempt to score. McGlinn took the kickoff on his own 12 and latederated to Fullback LeMay, who made three more before being brought down. McGlinn fumbled on the next play, recovered but was sneezed by a defender for a 10-yard loss to the nine-yard line.

Taking a desperate chance and courting disaster, McGlinn latederated to LeMay on the goal line. Catching the Hilhi defense flat-footed, LeMay raced 10 yards upfield. Another multiple lateral,

## Roosevelt Popular with Pedagogues

If the school teacher vote of three counties is any indication in political matters, President Roosevelt will carry this part of Oregon three to two, according to a ballot taken Monday at the tri-county teachers' institute held in Hillsboro.

Of the total of 625 votes cast, 334 were for Roosevelt, 251 for Landon, 34 for Thomas, socialist; 6 for Lembeck, union party candidate, and three for Earl Browder, communist. There were more than 700 teachers registered at the meeting, leaving a number who failed to vote.

Senator Charles McNary was a five times more popular than his opponent, Willis Mahoney, despite the fact that someone, during the meeting, placed Mahoney pictures on the teachers' automobiles. McNary received 516 votes to Mahoney's 92.

The state bank bill was only slightly more popular than the mining plan of Klamath Falls. There were 105 of the teachers in favor of the bank and 398 against it.

## Dangers of Tax Limiting is Cited

Dangers of the "Amendment limiting and reducing permissible taxes on tangible property," to be voted on Tuesday, were pointed out by a speaker at the union high school here this afternoon.

He pointed out that the University of Oregon bureau of research and service, estimated that Washington county property tax revenue will be reduced from \$396,918 in 1936 to \$289,949 in 1942, a total reduction of \$106,969 or 27 per cent.

There would be little money remaining to pay the salaries of employees of the county other than elected officials specifically provided for by state laws, it was pointed out. It was held that the big property owners were the ones who would gain.
