Sheriff Spends Hours at Work

Records Reveal More Than 1000 Arrests

Where one man is arrested, there probably is at least 10 investigations, comparison of arrest records and reports on investigations in the office of the Washington county sheriff disclose.

During the last four years, with John Connell as sheriff, there have been more than 1000 arrests resulting in a conviction in 96 per cent of the cases in which the sheriffs forces have investigated and gathered evidence, the records show.

Every manner of violation and alleged violation falls to the lot of the sheriff in his daily work, while in the more than 1000 arrests are violations of laws governing larceny, drunken driving, auto theft, reckless driving, moral cases, bad checks, forgery, murder and many others.

Since the depression affected tax collections and necessitated cuts in salaries and personnel in the court house, the Sheriff's office has been operating with two deputy sheriffs despite the fact that the same officers on day patrol were compelled to spend many nights and answer telephone calls after hours, in keeping peace in Washington county.

Labor troubles, also have been held at a minimum in berry fields, hop yards and lumber camps, mostly through diplomatic means, Sheriff Connell points out.

In addition to all of this, Sheriff Connell handles many visitors each day, answering questions and giving advice on situations which might otherwise result in trouble to be aired later in criminal or civil actions in the courts.

Long Illness Fatal to Aged County Man

Alonzo D. Chamberlain, 76, resident of the county for the last 15 years, died Saturday following an illness of five months. He was born February 23, 1860, in Pennsylvania. During his life he followed the trade of cabinet maker.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Donelson & Sewell funeral chapel with Rev. Putnam officiating and burial was in the Hillsboro cemetery.
