Danger of Whooping Cough Epidemic Pointed Out in Statement by Nurse

With an epidemic of measles and scarlet fever in this county during the past year, schools and parents must now be on guard for an epidemic of whooping cough.

Already scattered cases of this disease have been discovered, she points out, and medical history discloses that this disease usually follows other epidemics.

"Whooping cough is a contagious disease and should be avoided as ardently as infantile paralysis. Indeed it causes more deaths among babies than any other communicable disease.

"There have been scattered cases in the west end of the county, and parents, especially those of children under five years, are advised not to take them to public gatherings or homes where there is illness.

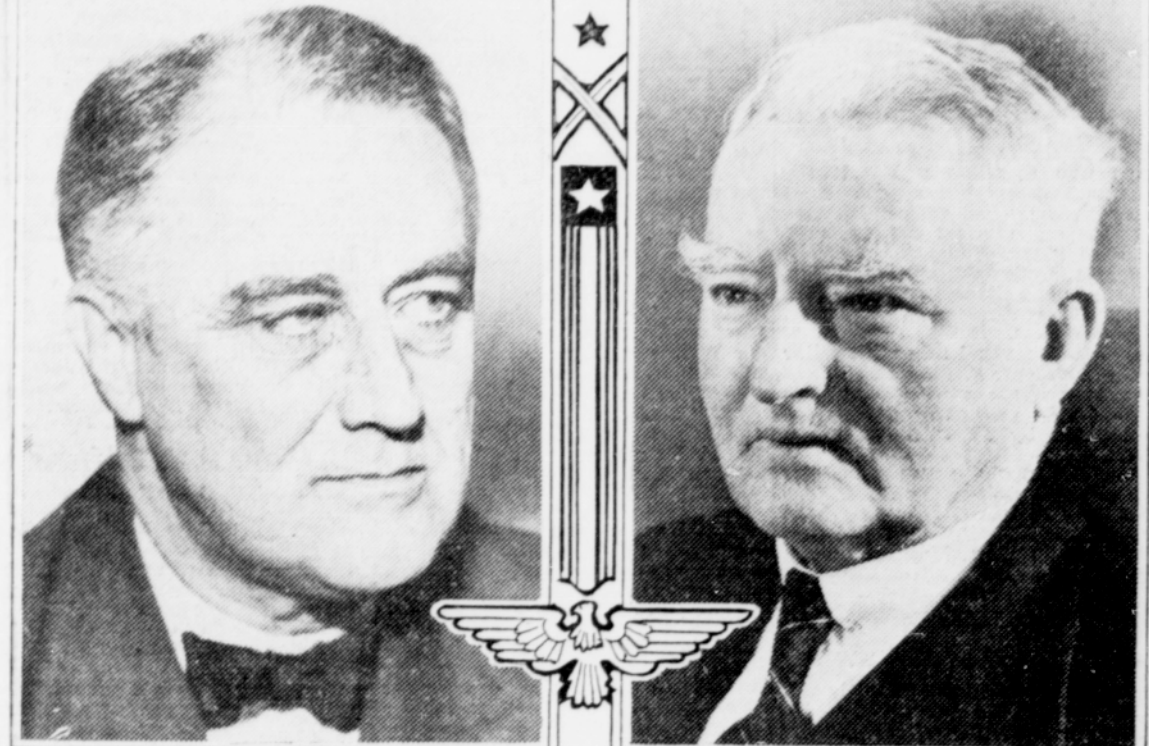

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Voters Return Mayor Garrett

Citizens Flood Polls for Record Vote Here

City election returns, completed at noon Wednesday, disclosed J. H. Garrett, present mayor returned to office by a plurality of 94 over his opponent, Hugh Rogers.

In the early returns, the voting was close, with first Garrett and then Rogers swinging into the lead. Both candidates carried on, either personally or by their friends, a rather intense campaign.

Heaviest voting was in north Hillsboro, where 542 persons marked ballots, while the second largest was in southeast Hillsboro, where 535 ballots were counted.

Number voting in southwest Hillsboro was 437.

In the north precinct, Garrett received 304 votes to 238 for Rogers, while the closest tally was in the southwest precinct, where Garrett received 225 votes and Rogers 212. Garrett received 275 votes in the southeast precinct and Rogers 260.

E. A. Griffith, in north Hillsboro, Mrs. C. E. Wells, in southeast Hillsboro and Arthur Kroeger in southwest Hillsboro, all unopposed, have been elected councilmen to replace John Anderson, M. Person and M. H. Stevenson, all retiring.

Crew Clearing Camp Location on Wolf Creek

Clearing of a camp site on Wolf creek road, near the point where Columbia, Clatsop, Tillamook and Washington counties border, is under way, according to Kenneth E. Tiltonson, resident engineer of WPA. Construction of buildings will begin as soon as the clearing is completed.

Another camp site further west also has been selected and work there probably will begin soon. When completed, crews from Portland will be moved to occupy the camps during the work period.

Announcement last week of federal appropriations of \$1,422,730 will serve to speed up the work of establishing camps, it is thought. The total is divided into three funds, \$317,004 and \$686,735 for Wolf creek and \$258,991 to be used on Wilson river.

Engineers are of the opinion that the sums set aside for Wolf creek will be sufficient to carry the clearing and grading of the entire 17 miles of unfinished road through to completion, while further sums will be needed on Wilson river.

Twelve miles of rock surfacing on the Tillamook end of the Wilson river road is underway with prospects that the entire project will be passable all winter, according to a dispatch from Tillamook. All of the base rock is in place to Jordan creek.

On Mills creek, east of Jordan creek, a crew has installed the footing for 156-foot span. The bridge is 36 feet above the creek.

From Jordan creek, the highway follows the course of the old Wilson river road to McNamar creek. Here is a small village with a mess house, offices and 15 bunk houses. Beyond the camp is a 150-foot log bridge over Wilson river which gives access to the road ahead.

Beyond the bridge two miles of right-of-way have been cleared, but not graded and some of the heaviest work in grading is found in this section.

Hundreds of laborers will be engaged all winter in construction work in the heart of the mountains, thrusting the new highway toward the summit, where it will connect with the Washington county end.

Connection probably will be established sometime next autumn.

Monday, an inspection party which included the county courts of Washington and Tillamook, L. G. Apperson, engineer in charge of the Wilson river work, and Kenneth E. Tiltonson, resident engineer WPA, inspected the highway to within about a mile of the summit.

The Tillamook visitors expressed themselves as well pleased with progress made and spoke optimistically of connecting the two counties.

Feeding Turkeys for Thanksgiving to be Subject for Poultry Men Thursday

H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman, will discuss finishing turkeys for market at a meeting for the Washington county turkey growers which will be held at the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce November 12 at 8 p. m., according to L. E. Francis, assistant county agent.

The unusually dry fall has introduced some new angles in the turkey program, states Francis, with the result that many of our turkeys are going to require some particular attention in order that they may be properly finished for market and in order to avoid as far as possible pinny birds.

As the turkey marketing season approaches, a discussion on finishing birds, with special reference to the current problems, should be of interest to the turkey raisers.

The meeting is open to the public and anyone interested in the problems to be discussed will be welcome to attend.

County Goes to Roosevelt Two to One

Hughes, Connell, Carpenter, Lewis and Tupper Elected Republican Ticket

Antrim Named Representative; Close Races Made

Nipped by the frost of public opinion in Washington county as well as in the state and nation, republican hopes for a republican president for the next four years faded and died at the polls Tuesday.

In the county, five of the seven candidates on the republican ticket succeeded in breasting the rising Roosevelt tide and landed with safe majorities. The winners were E. L. Ross, democrat, state senator; J. W. Hughes, republican state representative; Ray L. Antrim, democrat, state representative; James Lewis, commissioner; Arthur Tupper, county clerk; John W. Connell, sheriff; J. E. Carpenter, county assessor, republicans.

Ahead of 1932

Roosevelt ran more than two to one ahead of Landon, polling 8641 votes to Landon's 4148, running up a bigger majority than in the Hoover election of 1932 when the county was 6824 for Roosevelt and 4301 for Hoover. The republicans cast 153 votes less this year than in 1932 while the democrats increased their vote 1817, or a small increase over their increase in registration this year.

Lemke, touted as a strong candidate, polled 715 votes while Thomas received a few scattered votes. Lemke was the candidate of an attempt third party, while Thomas headed the socialist ticket.
