Prune Growers to Ratify Agreements

Growers representatives from the prune districts of Oregon and prune packers of the northwest will meet together in Portland soon to formally ratify verbal agreements already made on basic phases in the proposed plan or advertising of Oregon prunes. As a result, observers look forward to appearance of advertising on Oregon prunes in selected markets during the coming winter—in time to aid in marketing the 1936 crop.
 The coming Portland meeting will formally put into operation the movement begun with meetings held during the summer and early this fall. Herb Normandin of Forest Grove was named by local growers to represent Washington county. Similar growers' gatherings in other counties also named representatives to confer with packers on ways and means of replacing lost markets for Oregon prunes.
 The growers' committee, composed of all representatives from the principal prune growing counties of Oregon and Washington, is incorporating as "Oregon Prunes, Incorporated," to receive funds from prune growers through the packers and to disburse said funds to promote consumption of Oregon prunes through advertising, research, or by any other means.
 It is predicted by members of the industry that all packers will fall in line to act as collection agencies, deducting \$1 a ton from payments to growers, thus creating the fund for an advertising campaign. This rate was arrived at by the growers' committee as being equitable for all sizes. Agreements for collection of funds will be made by the packers between themselves and with Oregon Prunes, Inc., thus assuring that every man who markets prunes will contribute. Money raised will be turned over to the new corporation, according to the plans, and this group, made up entirely of growers, will assume responsibility for effective expenditures.
 Besides Mr. Normandin the growers representing their various districts will be C. L. Firestone, Clark county; Wash. J. G. Hog, Polk county; Glen Riddle, Douglas county; Ted Mankertz, Marion county, and Vic Rees, Yamhill.

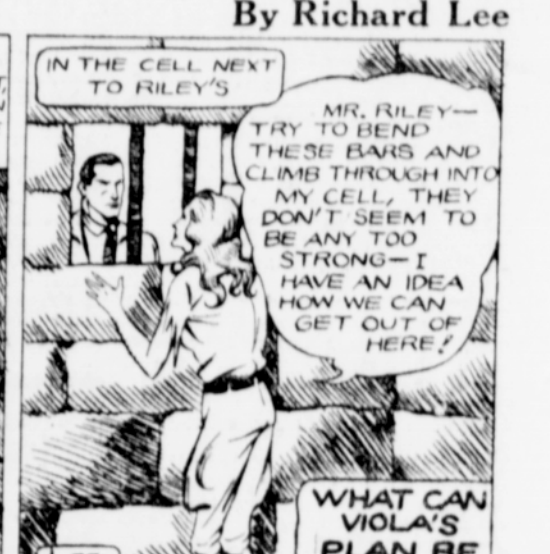
