The race was particularly close for United States senator with Ma-honey and McNary leading turn and turn about with McNary emerg-ing in the lead on unofficial totals of 27. Another race developed for state representative from this coun-ty between Antrim and A. M. Jannty between Antrim and A. M. Jannsen of Reedville, republican, Antrim emerging in the lead with 132 votes. Richard G. Scott of Sherwood, democrat, was in fourth place with 4898.

John W. Connell, returned to office again, led in the popular voting with 7894, the most votes cast for any county candidate. His opponent, Keith Abraham of Forest Grove, received 4770 votes.

J. E. Carpenter, republican, seeking a second term for county assessor, outstripped his Tigard opponent, P. W. Lillison, 7562 to 4041. While Connell polled the most votes, Lillison polled the least of any of the candidates in the county.

For a time the race between Ar-

thur Tupper, republican, and George Beazan of Tigard for county clerk, apparently might go either way. Tupper, however, came out of the race with an unofficial count of 6663 votes to his opponet's 5252. James Lewis, running for a sec-ond term as county commissioner, against Bert Hagen, Tigard real estate man, democrat, piled up a majority of 1153 with Hagen draw-ing his strength from the east side ing his strength from the east side of the county and a few strongly

democratic precincts.

John Thornburgh, Forest Grove banker, running for state senator on the republican ticket against E. L. Ross of Aloha, went down to defeat with a majority against him of 1603, Ross polling 7020 to 5417 for Thornburgh

Thornburgh.
VanWinkle carried the county easily on the republican ticket for attorney general with 6014 to 5297 for Dobson. Rufus Holman, seek-

for Dobson. Rufus Holman, seeking re-election as state treasurer, was a favorite, polling 6555 votes to 5232 for Burt.

James Mott, republican, walked away with the county for congressman, polling 7495 votes to 4949 for Kirkpatrick. In this particular race the Townsend vote is said to have played a big part, the state clubs endorsing Mott while Kirkpatrick made somewhat of a campaign on an anti-Townsend platform.


