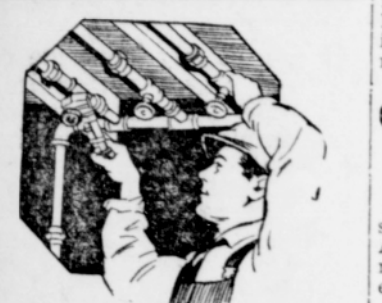
Bandon Fire Victims Given Aid by Pythian Sisters
