

Increase in Budget Asked

for 1937 are approximately the same as for 1936. The 1936 budget shows expenditures from the county general fund in the amount of \$174,937.75, while the 1937 budget anticipates expenditures from the same fund of \$173,403.31—a reduction of \$1,534.44. The 1936 budget shows expenditures from the county road fund of \$201,072, while the 1937 expenditures are estimated at \$204,400, or an increase of \$3,328.00; a net increase in expenditures for 1937 and 1936 from the two funds is thus shown in the amount of \$1,789.56.

"In spite of this comparatively small increase in expenditures the 1937 county tax levy will be approximately one mill higher than that of 1936, due to the fact that to effect the retirement of outstanding warrants the receipts from sources other than the 1937 tax roll have been estimated in an amount far less than in 1936. In preparing the 1936 budget the committee estimate the receipts for the general fund from sources other than taxation in the sum of \$112,545 and for 1937 in the sum of \$93,583.34, or a decrease of \$18,961.66. In the Road Fund the 1936 receipts were estimated at \$143,551.99 and for 1937 at \$204,400, or a decrease of \$60,848.01. This decided shrinkage in receipts accounts for the increase of \$24,874.70 in the 1937 levy. However, the estimate of receipts from sources other than taxation was made with the idea that no estimate should be made in an amount greater than that which the committee could reasonably expect would be collected and with the specific purpose of taking the necessary steps to retire all outstanding warrant.

"Four new items appear in the general fund budget and one of them has been revived. An item of \$3,740 was included for Bangs disease inspector. The 1935 session of the legislature made this levy mandatory by requiring the county to pay for the Bangs disease inspection. An item of \$800 has been included for blind assistance. This money is matched by the state and federal funds to assist blind persons of the county. An item of \$200 has been included for Washington county's contribution to the newly organized association of Oregon counties. This association has been organized for the purpose of protecting the counties at the legislative sessions and for increasing the efficiency of county government by an interchange of ideas and a standardization of procedure.

"An item of \$750.00 has also been included for the support of the county fair. This action was taken at the request of the Grangers, Farmers Union and other groups interested in the fair. It is the first appropriation for this purpose since 1931.

"The budget committee refused the requests which were made asking for the inclusion of an item to cover the expense of a home demonstration agent. This membership of the committee felt that such a program was worthwhile but that it was not advisable to include the item in the 1937 budget and enlarge further the increase in taxes made necessary due to the warrant situation.

"It is reasonable to expect that in another year the warrant debt will be so reduced as to make it unnecessary to levy one cent for their retirement. If that expectation becomes a reality the next budget can and shall be reduced by at least \$25,000 and still leave sufficient funds to permit the introduction of those improvements which are so much needed.

"The taxpayer meets the same problem which confronted the budget committee—the problem of meeting and paying our debts. The committee felt that this problem should be met squarely by making a levy sufficient in amount which, when coupled with receipts from delinquent taxes, would pay that debt and eliminate that burden.

"No unnecessary expenditures have been added. No costly innovations have been made. The 1937 taxes will be higher but for the one year only. The budget committee regrets the necessity of such action but it feels that it will have the cooperation and understanding of every informed taxpayer who realizes that public duties like private ones must be paid.

running nose, mild fever, bloodshot eyes and a dry cough which becomes progressively worse.

"If whooping cough is suspected, the safest procedure is to call your doctor and follow his directions exactly as given. Whether or not this is done, every child with a spasmodic cough which is worse at night, especially if there is vomiting, should be thought of as having the disease and kept strictly isolated. It takes about two weeks for "whooping" to start, and then not every child has this peculiar sound which resembles a gasp of surprise and is due to the gasping for air after a siege of coughing."

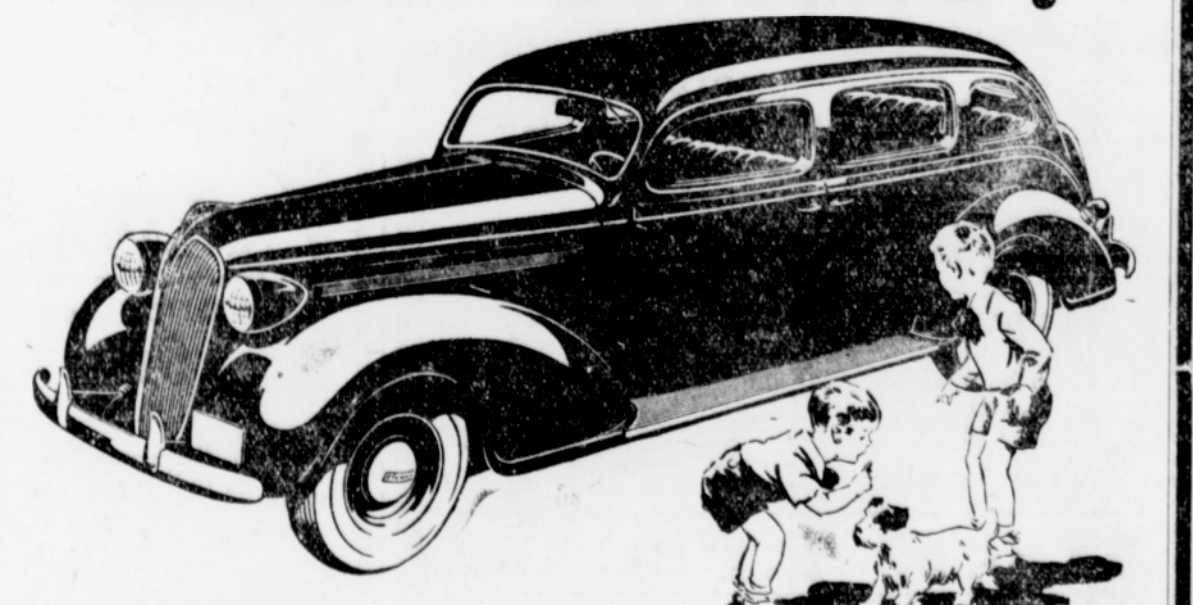
