

Hilhi and Alumni to Battle Friday in Benefit Game on Local Field at 2:45

Loggers Take Hilhi Friday

One-Point Lead Maintained from Early in Game

A fast charging line that crashed through to block Schulmerich's try for extra point from placement spelled disaster for Hilhi Friday afternoon on the local gridiron and sent the Vernonia Loggers home with a 7 to 6 victory. Hillsboro dominated the play during the last three-quarters of the game, chalked up 13 first downs to seven for the visitors but were unable to overcome the damage done by the visitors' powerful offensive in the first quarter.

Hilhi gridders opened the game in impressive style, carrying the ball all the way from their own 41 to the Vernonia 40 in five plays. Lady Luck turned against them at this point. Sigler, Hilhi left half, fumbling after gaining six yards and the visitors recovering.

Turning the tables with unexpected suddenness, Vernonia immediately proceeded to march relentlessly 66 yards for the opening score. Right Half Jarvis broke into the open on the first play, twisting and squirming his way for a 27-yard gain to the Hilhi 39. Five plays with Jarvis, Left Half Meeker and Fullback Henderson alternating in carrying the ball, gave the visitors a first down on the Hilhi 11.

Digging in and fighting desperately, the Blue and White momentarily staved off a score. Meeker picked up one on a delayed buck. Vernonia was penalized five yards for backfield in motion on the next play and then a pass fell incomplete with four down and a 12 yards to go. Jarvis suddenly burst into the open and headed goalward, only to be trapped and run out of bounds on the three-yard stripe by Sigler. Henderson crashed over center for the score and then Meeker crossed up the Hilhi defense by running wild over for the extra point that eventually meant victory for the visitors.

Not satisfied with a single score, Vernonia came right back with a 46-yard march to the local four-yard stripe. Hilhi's line stiffened to hold the visitors for downs this time and Vernonia never threatened seriously again.

With the opening of the second quarter, the Hilhi offensive started to click and the locals staged a touchdown march of their own, 79 yards from their own 21. Wahner opened the drive with a 10-yard smash over right tackle, picked up two more at center and then ran to the Right End Howell for a first down on the Blue and White 47.

Grogan, who substituted for Wohahn at right half, and Wahner gathered in another first down to the Vernonia 40. Two plays gained a scant two yards and then Wahner heaved a long pass downfield to Howell, good for 33 yards and a first down on the Logger nine. Hammering off right tackle, and with only seconds to go in the half, Wahner picked up seven yards on two plays.

Two seconds remained to play, hardly time to get a play started, and Vernonia obligingly called time out and killed it off during the rest and swung into action with the referee's whistle. Wahner started forward with the ball, just as the gun sounded, and crashed over for the score. On the try for point, the Vernonia linemen surged through as one man to smash down Schulmerich's place kick and protect the one-point lead that meant victory.

In the second half Hilhi repeatedly drove deep into Vernonia territory, only to have fumbles and bad breaks nullify scoring chances.

Two successful Hilhi "sucker" plays featured the last half. Midway in the third period Hilhi got into a bad bind with a one-point punt was back of his own goal line in punt formation, but the ball went to Wahner. Catching the Vernonia defense off guard, the Hilhi

speeder broke into the clear and raced upfield, apparently "away to the races." Suddenly the Vernonia right tackle, Lewis, appeared almost from nowhere to trap Wahner and run him out of bounds on the Loggers' 29.

Hilhi fumbled a few plays later and another well-placed Vernonia punt put the locals back on their own 12. Out of the bag of tricks came the old dust-covered Statue of Liberty play and it worked. Sigler gaining 30 yards before he was cornered and downed.

Neither side gained appreciably on the next series of downs and Hilhi took the ball on its own 26. Ketcham came into the Hilhi line and started to click again. With Ketcham crashing center for consistent gains of from four to seven yards and with Sigler making 20 yards on a reverse, Hilhi marched to the Vernonia 15. The locals suddenly took to the air with ill-fated results, the first pass being intercepted by Left End Storey on the 11.

Vernonia failed to gain on three plays and punted to Wahner on the Hilhi 45. He made 18 yards on the return, Ketcham picked up 13 yards on two line smashes and then Hilhi again took to the air. Three passes fell incomplete, one accompanied by a questionable decision when Howell apparently took the pass and fumbled when tackled on the 11, and the locals' final threat was gone.

Vernonia ran three plays slowly to use up time and punted. Sigler took the ball at midfield and turned 12 yards to the Vernonia 26 and ending the game. Wahner faded back and buried his desperate last-second pass that fell incompletely just beyond the outstretched fingers of the speeding Howell.

Wahner, Howell and Ketcham were outstanding in the Hilhi attack, while Schulmerich, Tsugawa, Peschka, Goodin and Stout starred in the line. Sutherland was back in punting form, more than holding his own against the visitors.

Meeker was the stand out player for the visitors, driving hard on offense and tackling with a vengeance on defense. Henderson, Byers, Jarvis and Baker rounded out the fast driving Vernonia backfield. The entire Vernonia line turned in a sparkling performance, matching the powerful Hilhi line in every department.

This Friday Hilhi will clash with the alumni squad on the local field in a benefit game. Gate receipts in the tilt sponsored by the Hillsboro Men's Breakfast club, will go into a fund to eventually provide lights and a grandstand for the athletic field.

On Armistice Day, the locals will travel to Tigard to meet the fast-rising Tigers.
