

Hilhi Eleven Comes from Behind to Beat Tigard 24 to 7 Armistice Day

Locals Defeat Tigers 25 to 7

Hillsboro Turns in One of Best Games of Season

Coming from behind in the second half with an offense and defense that clicked like clockwork, Hilhi trampled Tigard 24 to 7 on the Tiger gridiron Armistice Day. The locals got away to an early lead with a touchdown in the opening moments of the game, but Fullback Gaddis of Tigard put them in the hole with a brilliant 60-yard touchdown return on a punt and a conversion kick at the start of the final half.

Hilhi staged a 67-yard march from the opening kickoff only to lose the ball on downs on the Tiger 23. Sarinen, Tiger left half, and Gaddis made 22 yards on two plays and then Wagner, Hilhi full, recovered a fumble on the Tigard 45.

Immediately Hillsboro drove into pay dirt. Sigler smashed off tackle for five yards. Wajahn picked up through the line for eight yards and a first down. Schulmerich failed to gain on a tackle-around play. Sigler made two and then Wagner connected with a pass to Right End Howell for a first down on the Tiger five. Wagner craved over the two-yard line to score on the second attempt. Schulmerich's try for point was blocked.

Tigard's offense was completely bottled up until late in the second quarter, while Hilhi made one more thrust deep into Tiger territory. Tsugawa's pass interception on the Tigard 36 gave Hilhi a break. Wagner and Lair packed the ball to the Tiger five in seven plays, but lost the ball on downs at that point.

After an exchange of punts and with only minutes left in the half, Tigard opened up a 55-yard drive from the Tiger 10. Gaddis ran from punt formation for 11 yards and a first down. Left Half Rasmussen made one and then Sarinen made 13 yards and a first down on two plays. A penalty against Hilhi for too many times out aided the Tiger attack and then Gaddis took a lateral pass far out to the side and squirmed his way for a 25-yard gain. Rasmussen lost five yards as the half ended.

Hilhi got into a tough spot at the start of the second half when Lair missed a bad pass from center and was downed for a 21-yard loss to the Hilhi 20. Sutherland got off a towering punt to Gaddis on the Tigard 40. For a moment it seemed as though Tsugawa and Howell would drop him in his tracks, but the Tigard backs came to his rescue and broke him into the open.

Twisting and turning, shaking off

tackler after tackler, Gaddis raced up field, eluded the Hilhi safety and went over the goal line standing up. Boyer's kick split the uprights for the extra point and Tigard led 7 to 0.

The Tiger offense advanced well, however, as Hilhi came back with a smashing offensive to short 70 yards from the kickoff for a touchdown in three and a half minutes. Howell took the kickoff on his own 30, returning 12 yards. Wagner raced off right tackle for 27 yards and a first down on the Tiger 31. Wagner made five, Lair three and then Wagner cut loose for five more and a first down on the Tigard 18. Hilhi fullback then picked up eight yards on a punter and slanted over tackle for a first down on the seven-yard stripe. Sigler and Wagner alternated at the Hilhi ball for five yards and then Wagner went over to give Hilhi a 12 to 7 lead.

A 15-yard holding penalty put Hilhi back up against its own goal line shortly after the kickoff. Sutherland punted the Tiger 35, but a few moments later Sigler bobbed a punt and the Tiger recovered on the Hilhi 15. Gaddis was smeared for a one-yard loss and then Lair knocked down two of Sarinen's fine offensive plays, but a few moments later Sigler bobbed a punt and the Tiger recovered on the Hilhi 15. Immediately Hilhi uncoiled an 83-yard drive for a third score. Wagner made three yards off tackle and Lair added four through the other side of the line. The Hilhi line and blockers sprung Wagner into the open for a thrilling 32-yard gain to the Tiger 44. Sigler made five and then Wagner made five and then got into the open. A desperate Tigard defense finally cornered the Hilhi back and drove him out of bounds on the five-yard stripe. Tigard dug in to hold Wagner for two short gains. On the third try the Hilhi full crashed over into the end zone.

Tigard launched a passing attack in a desperate attempt to score, but after gaining 38 yards to the Hilhi 42, the chance-taking offensive back-fired as Grogan intercepted Gaddis' pass on the Hillsboro 35. Baumgartner, Sigler and Grogan, alternated with Wagner to advance the ball to the Tiger 26 on a straight line play. Then, with but 17 seconds to play, Hilhi's grid-der opened the way for a 26-yard touchdown run by Wagner. The game ended with a kickoff.

Hilhi turned in one of the best games of the season to date, every man on the field turning in a bang-up performance. Lair and Wagner, the later making all four of the Hilhi scores, were outstanding among the backs, while Howell, Goodin, Schulmerich, Tsugawa and Stout stood out by a narrow margin over the fine line play of their fellow forwards.

Sarinen proved a consistent gain-er for the Tigers, while Gaddis turned in the most sparkling run of the game with his 60-yard touchdown sprint. Miner, Talent and Boyer starred in the line.

because they were over-anxious, but because even when their feet were outside their bay-windows bulged over the line of scrimmage. Stealing a page from the Trojan's book of strategy, the alumni substituted by teams with little regard for reporting to officials or for noting whether or not a play was in progress. Twelve alumni were in on one play and at frequent intervals the game was held up as the two alumni teams agreed as to whose turn it was to play.

But enough of the game background and on the details of the Hillsboro Breakfast club's gridiron clinic.

Hilhi caught the alumni napping

with an inside kick to start the game. However, the advantage was short lived as Jim Grogan scooped up a fumble a few moments later to give the alumni the ball on the Hilhi 38. Three plays by Don Batchelor and Rushlow gained 17 yards and then "Pat" Bagley, alumni center, failed to get the ball back under his stomach and Hilhi recovered the ball. The varsity immediately punted and the alumni opened up a scoring drive from the Hilhi 36.

Don Batchelor had nine yards on an attempted pass and Rushlow failed to gain at center. Nothing daunted, Batch galloped as in days of yore for 29 yards and then turned on the speed to race 45 yards more for a score. John Hare, who was incidentally the Beau Brummel of the alumni with a really presentable gray jersey, booted the ball between the uprights for the only conversion of the game.

Moments later the alumni started another drive only to have Full-back Wagner intercept a pass on the Hilhi 40 and race 60 yards through the alumni second team for a Hilhi score.

Shortly after the start of the second quarter the alumni scored again on a "dead man" play. Rushlow passing to Chioti, who had laid out clear across the field on the Hilhi 19-yard line.

The ball sea-sawed back and forth during the balance of the half, sparked only by Rushlow's 50-yard run over the goal line for nothing. The effort winded the big fellow so that he had to call for a substitute. Returning to the fray shortly afterwards, Rushlow executed one of the most spectacular forward flips ever seen outside of a gymnasium. The alumni fullback raced downhill under a punt and failed to notice diminutive Lair. The latter threw himself across Rushlow's path in a perfect block. Rushlow arched into the air, made a complete somersault and landed unceremoniously flat on his back.

The varsity came back in the second half with a 76-yard march, but lost the ball on downs on the alumni 14-yard line. Don Batchelor made eight yards and then Rushlow passed to Jim Grogan for a 27-yard gain, but the drive went for naught as Batchelor fumbled shortly afterwards and Hilhi recovered. The varsity then drove from the alumni 39 to the 15, where the ball was again lost on downs.

Near the end of the third period Hilhi took a fourth down chance in midfield with the old Statute of Liberty play, but the alumni were too wise, spilled the play for a two-yard loss and took the ball off

the varsity 43. Immediately the alumni attack went into reverse. They were offside on the first play and Rushlow was smothered for a 19-yard loss on the next. A little matter of third down and 25 to go failed to discourage the alumni. Batchelor gained nine and then kicked to Sigler, who fumbled when tackled on his own 18 and Cook recovered.

Batchelor made eight yards, Cook failed to gain, Rushlow made one and then the alumni were offside, losing five yards. Batchelor then dropped back and heaved a perfect pass to Jim Grogan for the third and final alumni score. Schulmerich tried to place kick the extra point but the ball was low. Schulmerich then attempted to run the ball and the fiery varsity spilled him plenty.

By this time the alumni were tiring rapidly, equipment was gradually disintegrating and reserves were coming in fast. The last kickoff was fumbled and in the pile-up Referee Richardson went down under a sweeter of players. "Rich" kept blowing his whistle and the griders finally located him flat on the ground. However, the alumni were offside and the whole thing had to be done over. Moments later the game ended, much to the relief of the stars of yesteryears.

Despite the fact that many years have passed since some of the alumni trod the local gridiron, they still retain flashes of their former palmy days. Don Batchelor, a recent Linfield star, gave the fans a real display of running, passing and kicking ability. Rollin Deck proved he could still perform in the style that once made him known as one of the best "half-pint" guards of Hilhi. The whole galaxy of former backfield stars showed well and the linemen were nothing to be sneezed at.
