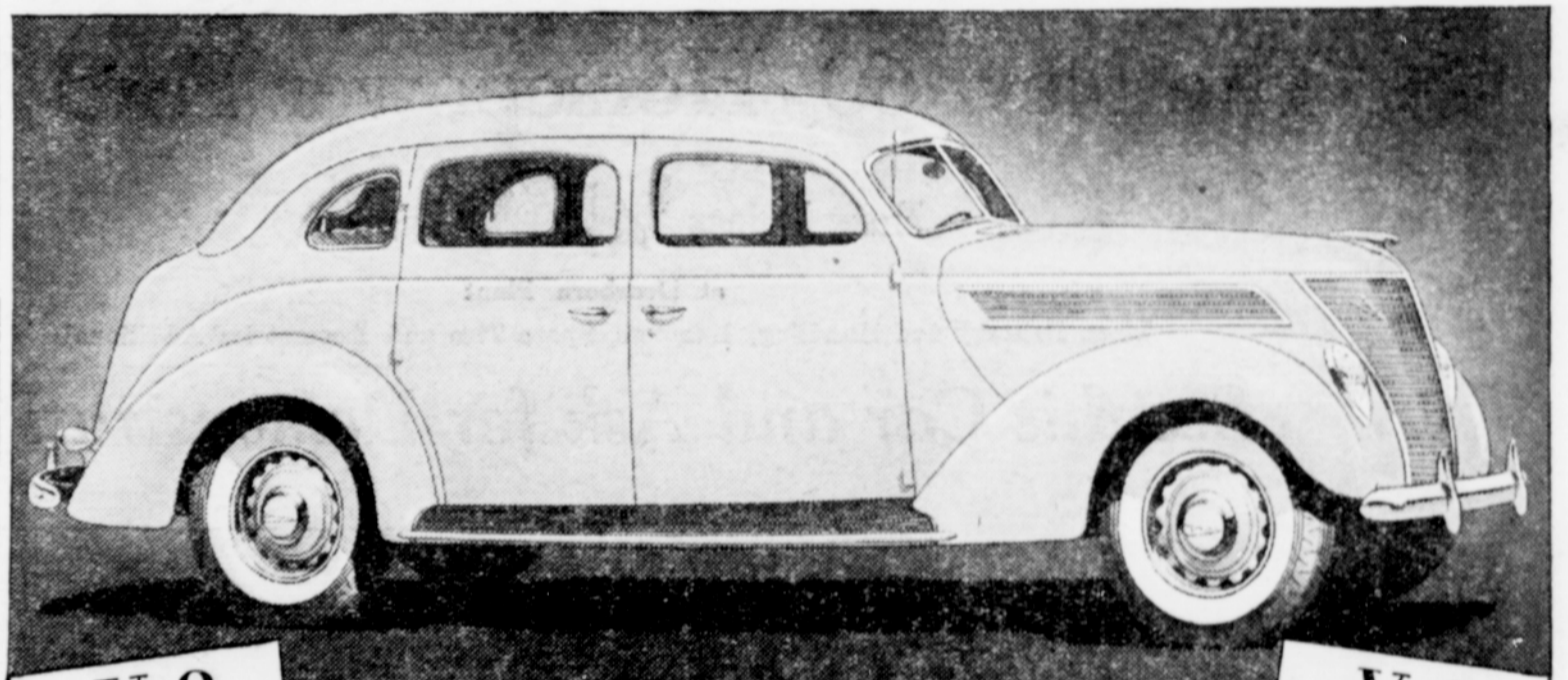
**ANNA BARBARA SHULTZ**  
 The funeral of Anna Barbara Shultz, 76, was held at the funeral home of Donelson and Sewell November 12 with the Rev. J. F. Shackelford of the Assembly of God officiating.

Anna Barbara Brandaw was born in Krautzburg, Germany, coming to this country at the age of 10 years. She married Otto F. Shultz in 1885. She was left a widow in 1912, coming to Hillsboro, March, 1933, where she had since resided. She is survived by a brother, Andrew Brandaw of Hillsboro, a son, Harry of Wauna, and two daughters, Lillian Thompson of Hillsboro, and Mrs. William Bestone of Portland. Mrs. Shultz's death came as a great shock to her friends, death being due to the extraction of teeth and a paralytic stroke, after a three days' illness.
