Multnomah "1 Man Gang" Re-captured

Multnomah county's youthful "one man gang," was back in the clutches of the law this week after a chase along the Pacific highway from Beaverton to Aloha Sunday by State Policeman Al Johnson. The youth, 15 years old, is alleged to have admitted the theft of four automobiles in three days.

Released Friday by the juvenile authorities of Multnomah county for a previous car theft, the boy is said to have immediately taken a machine from Portland, which he abandoned later in favor of another containing six cartons of tobacco, which he hid at his parents' home at Willamette.

Sunday he continued his raids and decided on a trip to Beaverton, and Officer Johnson spotted the paneled delivery as one reported stolen and gave chase. Finally, discovering that he was about to be overtaken, the boy jumped from the machine at Aloha and took to his heels, but was captured behind a building. He was taken to Portland and given into the custody of the juvenile authorities in Portland for further discipline.

Employers Must Register for Act

played; employees in the railway industry subjected to carriers' tax; agricultural labor; domestic service in private homes; casual labor not employed in the course of the employer's trade or business; services performed as an officer or member of the crew of a vessel documented under the laws of the United States or any foreign country; service performed in the employ of the state or government or political subdivision of either; and service in the employ of any group where no part of the net earnings inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

Benefits of the new system will be felt in 1942, at which time the first payments will be made. All persons reaching the age of 65 are entitled to draw a sum equal to 3 1/2 per cent of their total earnings. Therefore the longer they work the more money he draws in wages, the greater will be the benefits derived up to a maximum of \$85 a month.

Payments into the fund will begin January 1, after which time one per cent will be deducted from the wages of the employee to which the employer must add a similar sum. In 1940 the rate will begin increasing one-half of one per cent every three years until 1949 when the rate will become three per cent.

The new law raised a storm of criticism in some quarters, the attack being aimed particularly at the accumulating surplus which is to be invested in government bonds used to pay off existing bonds the same as any tax.

Out of the campaign criticism there arose a proposal to make the tax on payroll carry the load without establishing a surplus, and changes are expected to follow in the new congress.

Council to Pass Budget Tonight

Protest, if any, against the proposed city budget for 1937, will be heard tonight (Thursday) at 8 in the council chamber at the city hall. Budget proposes an increase in expense of approximately \$1000 a levy of 17 mills.

The proposed budget calls for a total municipal expense of \$32,600 as compared to \$31,640 a year ago. Increases in costs are found in various items and various departments of the city, all small.

On the budget committee this year are J. W. Bailey, Nye Bristol, V. W. Gardner, Morris Weil, O. Phelps and P. A. Anderson, acting with the city council.

Several Varieties of Grass Found Hardy in This County

Conditions for seeding grass on burr, same lanes, stump patches, swales, and various other areas which might be improved from the standpoint of applying pasture have not been very favorable this fall. Lack of moisture in the ground prevented most of the seed from germinating, but some has been seeded and more might well be if the pasture is to be permanent. Mixtures are preferable generally to single grasses, except on wet land where Reed canary grass is probably the most desirable grass crop that can be grown.

Highland canary grass offers a lot of promise and can well be seeded even on land where the Reed canary grass is ordinarily seeded. Apparently the Highland strain will stand just as much wet weather as the lowland can and will certainly do much better where the land is inclined to dry out in the summertime. This grass may take the place of some of our grass mixtures on some of the land where permanent pasture is desired. It certainly is something worth the consideration of any farmer where something really permanent is desired.

Oregonian grass and English rye grass should be included in any mixture, and can be used on rather dry land that is rather wet as long as it is not heavy overflow land. Along with these, it is a good plan to include a hardy perennial grass, such as tall oat grass, common white clover, timothy, and sometimes a little alsike or ladino clover. To get a really good pasture meadow will require 15 or 20 pounds of seed per acre.

Italian rye grass while excellent in its producing capacity the first

year and being extremely palatable, is not so good as to include in the mixture. It grows so rank its first year that it will retard and very nearly choke out some of the other grasses, but after its first year it begins to thin out and by the second year it is practically all gone unless it has reseeded itself. Under pasture conditions, it does not have an opportunity to do this.

Tall fescue is another new grass which seems able to stand over dry summer and fall weather here excellently and should, when seed is available, be used in all our upland pasture mixtures. As the present time there is practically no seed available, although one Washington county farmer, Elmer Guerber, route 1, Hillsboro, will in another year have a commercial supply of seed.

On the Antone Evers farm route 1, Forest Grove, the highland strain of canary grass this year made an extremely heavy growth and after being cut for seed showed quite a bit of after growth. While the seedling on the Evers' place was originally made in rows, the first planting now three years old has practically covered the ground. Seed of this variety is not available. On most of the land that canary grass is seeded on, spring seeding is much safer than fall seedings. Canary grass germinates extremely slow and, consequently, will not make sufficient growth to become well enough established to stand the frosty weather in early or late winter.

Uniform Plan Asked in Tax Delinquency

Largest delinquency levy is recorded at Beaverton where the levy dropped from 15.2 in 1936 to 9.6 mills for 1937. Valuation for 1937 also is lower, being \$1,138,575.49 as compared to \$1,322,443.58 for 1936.

Oregon lowered the levy for 1937 to 4.2 mills as compared to 4.8 mills for 1936. Valuation also fell from \$248,094.90 for 1936 to \$245,919.81 for 1937.

In Sherwood another drop in levy and a raise in valuation is shown. The valuation for 1936 being \$336,862.89 with a levy of 8.1 as compared to a valuation of \$328,428.52 with a levy of 6.3 mills for 1937.

Cornelius has a slight drop in valuation and a sharp raise in the levy for 1937. The valuation for 1936 was \$331,471.40 and levy 5.8 for 1936 as compared to \$530,440.65 valuation for 1937 and a levy of 8.2 mills.

Tigard has the highest levy of any district so far reporting to the assessor. Valuation for 1937 is \$1,353,921.93 as compared to \$1,344,736.46 valuation for 1936 and levy of 14.8 mills.

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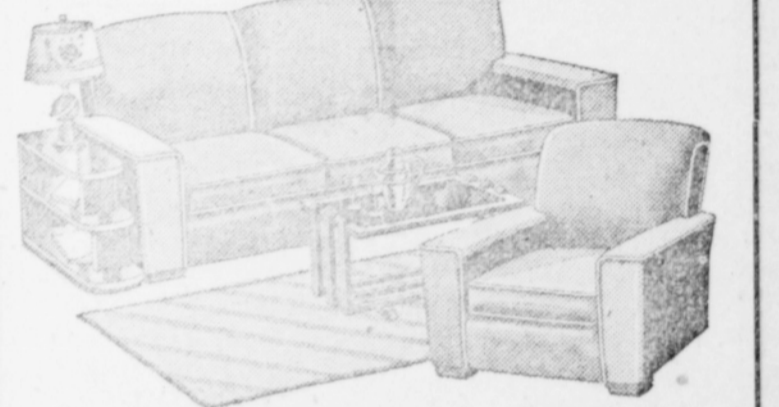
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
