

### Helvetia Man Dies Sunday; Burial Friday

Adolph Heinrich Meyer, 72, resident of Helvetia for the last 18 years, died at his home Sunday. He had been in poor health many years. He was born June 3, 1864, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Royal Gamewarden Friedrich Meyer of Roethen, Hanover, Germany. He came to this country when 16 and worked on a farm in Colorado.

Two years later he joined the U. S. army and served four years in the third U. S. cavalry regiment. He rode patrol in Yellowstone park for six months and was then transferred to New Mexico, where he saw plenty of action against the Apache Indians. He was honorably discharged in 1887, going into the sheep business in Wallowa county, Oregon, on 1400 acres of land which he owned, while 1907 saw him raising cattle on a 400-acre irrigation ranch at Joseph. He sold this farm in 1916 and moved to Portland and later to a farm near Helvetia.

Mr. Meyer was a member of the Masonic lodge of Joseph.

He leaves his wife, Anna, and seven children, Gertrude of Portland, Kurt, Anna Marie, Hilda, Herta and Rudolph at home, and Mrs. Willie Bielitzer of Kiel, Germany, and a grandchild.

Funeral services will be at the Donelson and Sewell chapel Friday at 2 p. m. with burial in the Helvetia cemetery.
