Hilhi Observes Book Week November 18-20

Hillsboro union high school held its annual Book Week exhibit, between November 18 and ending, November 20. Among the old books included in the exhibit was "The Practice of Physik" by Lazarus Riverius, who was counsellor and physician to the King of France and professor in the University of Montpellier in 1657. This book is from the library of the late Dr. S. T. Linklater and was lent by Kenneth Linklater. "History of the United States to the Close of the War with Great Britain in 1815" was lent by B. W. Barnes. "A Dictionary of the English Language" was also lent by Mr. Barnes, and originally belonged to his grandfather. It is a two by three inch miniature dictionary adapted from the London edition of Sharpe's Diamond Dictionary and published in 1838.

Among the books lent by Miss Katherine Wiley were three leather-bound school books, one of which was published in 1819. She also brought a copy of Godey's "Lady Book" of the year 1888. "Kenilworth" published in 1931 was lent by Sidney Seymour. Also on display were 31 pages of Chapter I of the original manuscript of the Indian romance, "The Bridge of the Gods," by Frederick Homer Balch. This book was first written in serial form, under the title of "Wahshet," and published serially in Harper's magazine. Later when the missionary character was introduced, it was published in book form. Seventy-eight pages of the story "Kenauka" later published in the book, "Tenasket," in Balch's handwriting with his notes and corrections on the back of many pages, were also shown with another manuscript by the same author entitled, "How a Cannas Prairie Girl Saw the World." These manuscripts are the property of Mrs. W. J. Enschede and were found stored in a barn on a Hood River ranch. A Bible published in 1849 was also lent by Mrs. W. J. Enschede.

The display included decorative book jackets, drawings and models from the English and art classes, and an exhibit of new books which have been added to the school and city libraries. The exhibit was arranged by students headed by Vivien Sacressen and Jeanne Ann Abts.

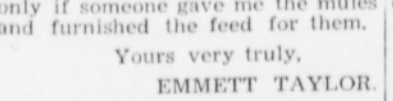

Tuberculosis Seal Seal Sale Starts Here on Friday

Generous response to tuberculosis seal sale offerings over Washington county this year means sales in excess of the record made last year when the total collected was nearly 3000. Twenty-fourteen and 115 schools in the county already are in possession of 121,900 seals which will be sold at a cent each.

The sale begins Friday morning and will continue until Christmas. This year the state health association is offering a cup to the county selling the most stamps per capita and Washington county has already declared intention to contest.

Proceeds of the sale are used for the fight against tuberculosis, furnishing funds for examinations, and tests for persons unable to obtain assistance themselves. The fund also finances work among the school children.

Of the total collected in this county 45 per cent is retained for work here and the remainder is turned over to the state association for state-wide work.
