Buy as many Christmas Seals as you possibly can and see to it that their health go to fight tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis still remains the leading cause of death in the productive years, 15 to 45, in spite of the fact that in the past 30 years the death rate from tuberculosis has been cut two-thirds. The tragedy of this disease is that deaths from it usually mean broken homes and orphaned children.

This December marks the thirtieth year the penny Christmas Seals have been sold. Their message is an appeal to every thinking man and woman in the country to help in the war to wipe out tuberculosis before the next 30 years have passed.

The idea was first proposed in this country in July, 1907, after a postal clerk in Denmark, Einar Holboll, in 1903 conceived a non-postage stamp to be used as a messenger of hope on letters and parcels. Issued the next year by the government, this half-cent sticker raised enough money to start a sanatorium for tuberculosis Danish children.

The Philadelphia North American, after hearing of the plan from Emily P. Bissell of the Delaware Red Cross, put on a real campaign to aid in raising money for an open-air shack in Delaware. By January the sales netted \$3000 for the Delaware shack. The North American again went to bat in a big way the second year -first to be nation-wide was sponsored by the American Red Cross and brought in \$135,000. The seed of physical salvation for millions had been well and carefully planted. The National Tuberculosis association had been strongly established by 1920 and had taken over from the Red Cross the sole sponsorship of the Seal sale.

Only five per cent of the proceeds from a purchase of Seals is turned over to the national association, a small per cent goes to the state associations and the rest stays in the community to carry on this great fight against the dread disease.

It is a great and humanitarian work given in the past and will do so in the the headlines. future in the efforts to stamp out as far as possible the ravages of tuberculosis.

The stitutional limit will be raised through income taxes, inheritance and gift taxes and miscal page. and gift taxes and miscellaneous revenues including fees and licenses paid by corporations and insurance companies.
