This post-election boom also has investors worried. The current fever of optimism, has ignited Wall street. Stocks are up day 30 per cent higher than last year.

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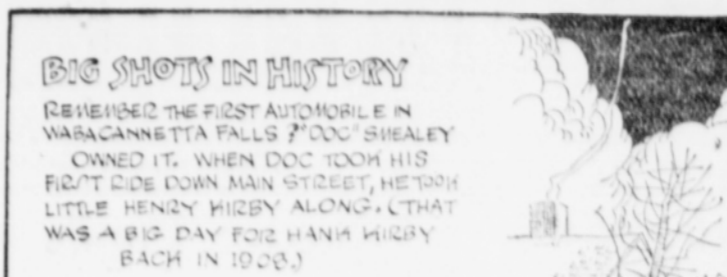
