Luce, he said, characteristically remarked that he couldn't give anyone a job until after the election as it was unlawful. Later Luce called him in and told him he was hired.

Luce began his public service under the late George Morgan and then served four years as deputy clerk under John Bailey. He was elected clerk for the first time in 1913, served a term and then returned for a year-and-a-half.

He returned to the court house as deputy in 1919 under H. A. Kurati and served to 1925 when he ran for county clerk and was again elected. He has served in that capacity since.

Special entertainment was furnished by the high school boys' quartet under the direction of Miss Lucille Fisher and Miss Edwyna Broadbent who were introduced by B. W. Barnes. Members of the quartet are Walter Foelker, David Crittenden, Tom Stretcher and Allan Sigler.

Next Monday Mrs. C. E. Wells, E. A. Griffith and Arthur Kroeger, newly elected councilmen, will be guests of the chamber, each being allotted time to explain what they expect to accomplish during the next year. Mayor J. H. Garrett will be chairman.

Preliminary plans also were announced for a Christmas party December 14 in the evening, in the chamber rooms with the members bringing their wives as a variation of the usual "Stag Party."
