What Other Editors Say

Our State Police

Rumors reaching Hood River are to the effect that, in the next session of the state legislature, a determined effort is to be made to secure passage of a law which would effectively bar out state police from providing protection for workers and others during progress of a strike of union laborers. We are told that it will require all the strength which can be mustered among upstate legislators to meet and defeat this bill, which is expected to be offered by legislators from Portland, who received a heavy union labor vote early this month.

Many of us whose memories are not too short, recall what happened here during progress of the ill-advised and abortive strike at the mill at Dee and the early show of violence and coercion which fol-lowed. We recall that some of the strikers attempted to hold up movement of cars on the U. P. tracks here in Hood River, 14 miles from the zone in which the strike was in progress, and several of the leaders indulged in violence against men who persisted in refusing to recognize that a strike was in progress a mill which continued to work at near capacity. We have every reason to know what would have happened here, had not Governor Martin issued orders to Chief Pray, who, in turn, dispatched a strong unit of state police to this city and to the mill at Dee.

If the proposed bill ever reaches the legislature. we are going to hear a lot of verbiage about using the state police to break strikes. But we hope our upstate legislators will not permit themselves to be deceived. The state police, as fine a body of men as can be found anywhere, were not sent out to break strikes, they were requisitioned to keep groups of lawless strike leaders and beat-ups in order and to protect men who believed that, as Americans, they had the right to refuse to join a union if they wished to maintain their old status of independence. That was the issue involved when the state police were ordered to strike zones, and we bring these facts to the attention of Senator Stadel-man and Representative Munroe, who will go to Salem in the interests of this section of the Mid-Columbia .- Hood River News.
