

New Members Local Council Speak of Plans

Hillsboro's freshmen members of the city council were guests Monday noon at the chamber of commerce party Monday night at which wives of the members will be guests.

Both Ide and Garrett are members of the chamber of commerce aviation committee. Plans rapidly are rounding into shape for the chamber Christmas party Monday night at which wives of the members will be guests.

Declaring that he deemed it unwise to make any statements concerning his intentions, Arthur Kroeger of the southwest precinct was the first to speak. He said that among the things which he thought should be continued in Hillsboro, were clean streets and an efficient police department. He also stated that he would like to see some disposal made of overhead wires which would allow trees to grow to their full height.

There also were several old buildings, Kroeger said, which had outlived their usefulness to Hillsboro. Concerning utilities, Kroeger declared that he could not see where government had any place in private business, although there might be exceptions which could make it necessary for government to step in.

He closed with the remark that he sought service on the council because he felt that every American citizen owes something to the government and should be interested in the service of that government.

E. A. Griffith, councilman from the north ward, said that he had been a resident of Hillsboro and the county for the last eight years, coming to Oregon in 1922 and to North Plains in 1928.

He declared that as a real estate man, he found home seekers interested in the schools and taxes of a community. Among the things Griffith said he would like to see in Hillsboro, were a lot of new homes and remodeling of old homes, and have the rules enforced as to motorists and the safety lanes for school children. He also stated that unless there were extenuating circumstances, he was opposed to public ownership of utilities.

Mrs. C. E. Wells, the third member of the council and Hillsboro's first councilwoman, opened her talk with the remark that many persons had wanted to know why she should seek a place on the city council.

"I tell them," she said, "that I want such work to keep myself out of mischief." She said that, like the rest, she did not believe in making promises, and spoke of her 20 years as a member of the Hillsboro school board. "I tried not to presume because I was a woman," Mrs. Wells said, "and I believe that all the men I have dealt with on the school board will tell you that I did not."

Always, she declared, she has tried to look at a question from all sides. Among the things which she would like to do as a councilwoman is to sell the city to the people of Hillsboro.

One of the questions is that of safety, she told the chamber members, and she was of the opinion that enforcement of the traffic laws would help in curbing traffic deaths and accidents. She suggested that white clothing would help in the matter of traffic and school children.

Mayor Garrett told the luncheon group that he attended an interesting meeting of the Northwest Aviation Planning Council in Portland Friday. He told of some of the advances made in aviation and

related how one transport manager told of moving 11 horses to a remote mine in Canada by airplane.

W. G. Ide spoke briefly of the same meeting, having attended Saturday.
