Holly for Shipping Should be Treated

Those people having holly which they wish to ship, or send through the mail, and who did not ask for an inspection of the holly trees last summer, may still ship this stuff by having it dipped. Arrangements for dipping holly have been made by the state department of agriculture and anyone may take it to the dipping station on Broadway across from the post office building at the end of the Broadway bridge, Portland.

According to regulations of the state department of agriculture all holly must be inspected or sprayed to be certain that it is free of scale. These inspections were made on request last summer by a representative of the department. The arrangement for dipping was announced locally last week by C. A. Cunningham, inspector of the Oregon department of agriculture.

County Rock Crushers Start Winter Operation

Three Washington county rock quarries were placed in operation during the past week including Jackson, Laurel and Durham. Rock from the quarries is being used to patch roads for winter. 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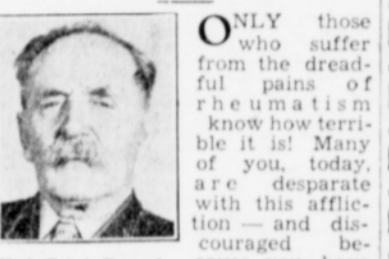
