Nursery School Has Open House Here Thursday

David Hill Nursery school held open house in its large rooms Thursday. Miss Mary Enslin, head nursery teacher, and Miss Margaret Missimer, assistant teacher, received guests and explained the work of the school.
 This is one of seventeen such projects in Oregon, and Hillsboro is considered fortunate in being selected for a nursery school at various towns are asking for them.
 The school is now open to a few more little children between the ages of two and five, until its capacity has been reached. It is no longer a strictly relief plan, but is open to any child of this age. The children develop along lines of independence and getting along with others, and in habits of health. They receive a good meal each day, and rest in bed, and cod liver oil and tomato juice. They respond remarkably in the group when effort to home alone have sometimes failed.
 Various social service groups were represented at this meeting, including the Coffee club, the Rotary club, the Service club, the Parent-Teacher association, and other groups. Gifts of toys and kitchen equipment and lumber have already been received, and a few other things are needed for this valuable work for little children.
 Mrs. Ben Faber of the P. T. A. was selected to head a committee of representatives from the service organizations to foster the nursery school so that Hillsboro may not lose it to some other Oregon town. The state project is handled out of the office of State School Superintendent Howard, and is educational and non-political.

nature of the chemical agents will be furnished to the physicians of this state upon application. The chemical agents are not recommended for general use. They can be used on an experimental basis but should be used only under properly controlled conditions by especially qualified physicians. In order to be effective the entire area of the nasal mucous membrane must be covered with the solution. It is absolutely essential that the treatments be carried out under the supervision of trained physicians especially familiar with the anatomy of the nose and throat. The chemical agents should be applied only by the physician and not self-administered.
 Disinfection of the nose and throat by the use of antiseptics is of doubtful value. In concentrated solution germicides damage the delicate mucous membrane of the nose and throat and destroy the natural defense mechanism.
 No other chemical compound is applied to the body as frequently as soap. With one's hands often in contact with contaminated objects, the common procedure of washing the hands with soap and water is of the greatest significance. Soap probably does not always destroy bacteria, but it does remove them. A mechanically clean skin is able to free itself of pathogenic organisms, a power not shared by a dirty skin. Keep your hands clean and in most cases the healthy mucous membrane of the nose and throat will take care of itself. Ernest C. McCullough in his excellent book on Disinfection and Sterilization, published by Lee and Febiger, makes this authoritative statement.

DISINFECTANTS AND INFANTILE PARALYSIS
 (By Oregon State Board of Health)
 The daily application of disinfectants to healthy tissues—which is common since it became the fashion to use medicated eye and mouth washes, sprays and douches for the mouth, nose, and throat—interferes with the healthy defense mechanism of the tissue cells and ultimately prepares a fertile field for infection. The public is led astray by pseudo-scientific medical articles and vicious advertisements which are calculated to frighten people into using certain disinfectants. This type of advertising has created a germ phobia in the minds of many. Perhaps it is well that many widely advertised mouth washes, nasal douches, and sprays are without significant germicidal action when used as directed. All applications to the mouth, nose and throat should be used only on the advice of your family physician.
 In poliomyelitis, or infantile paralysis, it is of course of importance that every effort be made to destroy the infection. The nose and throat discharges of all persons suspected of having poliomyelitis should be immediately disinfected by incineration, boiling, or by the use of approved and reliable disinfectants.
 It is the consensus of opinion that the virus of poliomyelitis enters the body by way of the nasal mucous membrane. Experiments upon monkeys have demonstrated the fact that the use of certain chemical agents, when properly applied, affords a remarkable degree of protection to monkeys. The exact
