### Police Search for Lost Man

When Fred Nantz, 33, woodcutter near Shady Brook, left home a week ago for Portland to make arrangements to transport the body of his wife to the family home in Oklahoma for burial, he dropped from sight.

Search, instituted by Sheriff John Connell through Portland police, has failed to reveal any clue to the disappearance of Nantz other than the statement by a truck driver from the wood camp that the man exchanged him to Portland Tuesday, December 15, and was to have met him later for the ride home.

Nantz had about \$150 in cash in his possession, a fund which had been raised by sympathetic citizens to assist Nantz in carrying out the dying request of his wife—that she be buried at her home.

Meanwhile, with the money for transportation missing more than a week, Mrs. Nantz was buried in Hillsboro cemetery Tuesday following a short service in the Donelson & Sewell funeral chapel.

Robert, a married son, Clifford and Pauline, younger children, remain at the wood camp doing what they can to aid in the search for the father, while the remainder of the family is in Oklahoma.

Mr. Nantz came to this county last March and procured a job cutting wood, sending for his family and invalid wife after he could accumulate enough money for transportation. They arrived last August, and Mrs. Nantz died December 12.

### Funeral Held Here for Mrs. T. Nissen

Marie Nissen, 70, resident on Hillsboro route 2 for the last 34 years, died in her home there Monday. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the Donelson & Sewell funeral chapel with burial in Lewis cemetery at Farmington. Rev. Henry Haller officiated at the funeral service.
