Beaverton Bank High on Gaston Issue of Bonds

GASTON—The bids on the \$7500 bond issue of the town of Gaston were received and opened by the recorder, Don E. Schanck, December 14. The bid of the First Security Bank of Beaverton was found to be the highest and best offered. It was \$101 for each \$100 face value of the bonds, and in addition there accrued interest at 4 per cent from December 1, 1936, to delivery of the bonds. The bonds are in denominations of \$500 each. The town has the option of redeeming any or all of the bonds after December 1, 1941.

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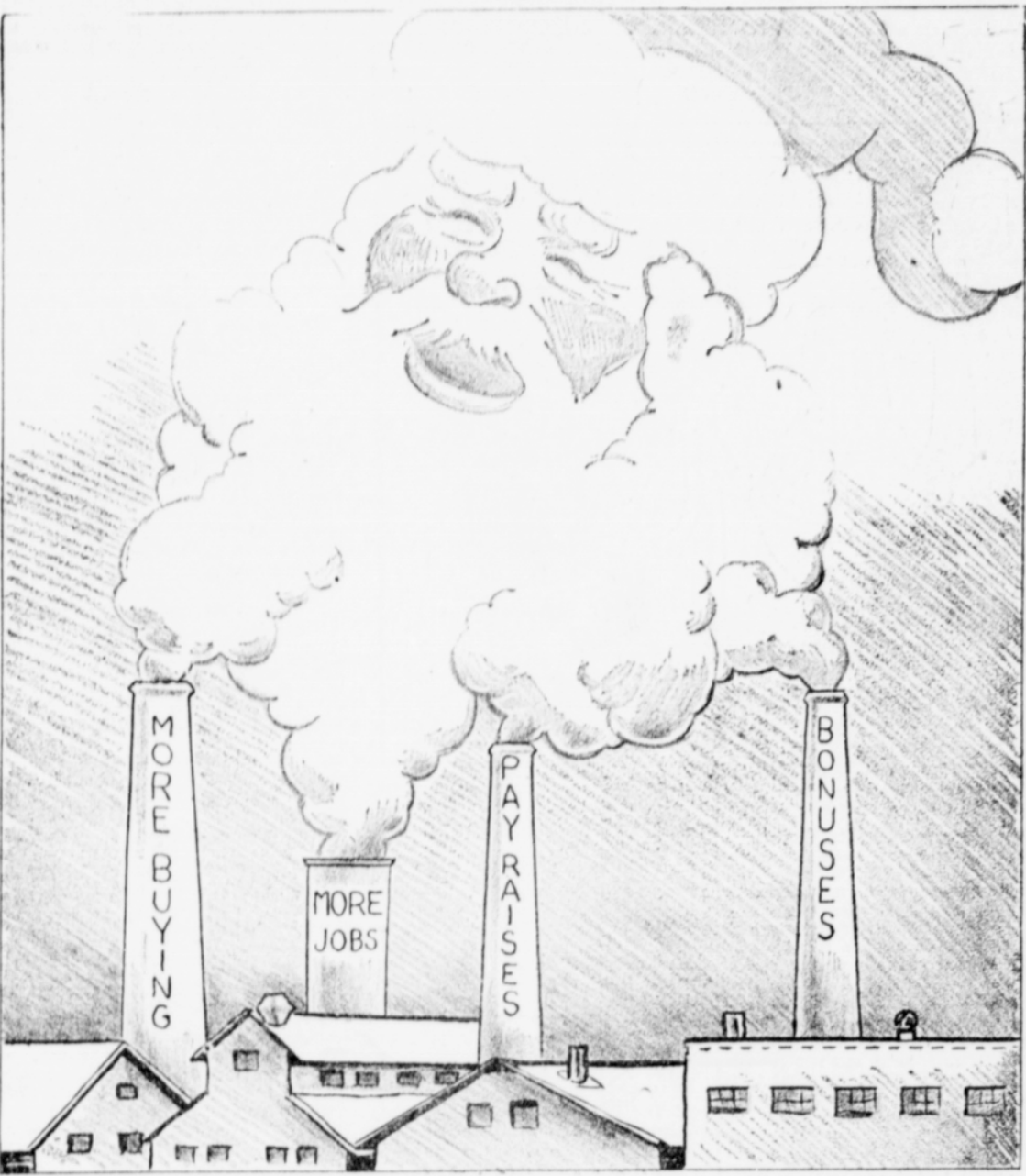

New Model Fords Feature Quietness
In the 1937 model Ford V-8, automobile engineers have concentrated on quietness of operation. To insure against body noises, the under surface of the steel top is covered with insulating material and door panels are sprayed with insulating material.

The engine is completely cushioned in rubber and a new fan design contributes a share to quiet operation. Changes have been made to quiet rear axle and inter-leaf lubrication of spring helms. All models have silent helms gears in second and high speeds.

Time for Checking
Every time a car is greased the steering mechanism and other parts such as tie rods, steering arms, and drag link should be checked for looseness and wear, according to the emergency road service of the Oregon State Motor association.
