SLEEP AND GROWTH (By Oregon State Board of Health) "When King Alfred the Great apportioned time he recommended that eight hours of each day be given for sleep. In other words, that one-third of the life time of the adult of the human race be spent in sleep, that the body be sufficiently refreshed to meet the

emergencies of the remaining two-thirds of life which he allotted to work and recreation.

"This for adults. How then about little children who have as yet acquired a small amount of body resistance? During the earliest weeks of life a child should sleep from twenty-one to twenty-two hours each day; at one year, sixteen hours; at six years, twelve hours and at eighteen, nine hours.

"But time is not the only factor to be considered in sleep. Not only how long, but how restful is sleep? When the child goes to bed, in what condition is he physically and nervously? Has he had a light nutritious supper that will be easily digested? Are his surroundings comfortable? Is his bed time at a regular and early hour? Is his room well ventilated? Has he possibly enlarged tonsils and adenoids which interfere with his breathing? All of these things should be taken into account that children may sleep quietly and restfully.

"Many children who are under-nourished, pale and fretfully nervous, play about supposedly in good health, who are in reality in this state because of lack of sleep. Sleep is just as essential to a child's well-being as nourishing food, as warm clothing in winter, or as fresh air and sunshine. Children that are allowed to go to bed when they choose, even if the time be as late as nine or ten in the evening, who are allowed to go to bed "mopey," who are excused from the regular bed-time hour in the summer because of daylight saving time can never be as sturdy as those who are accustomed to regular hours of sleep.

"Sleep is the regular method by which nature makes the necessary body repairs. Normal children play hard, thus using up their energy. The food that they eat keeps up digestive activities to supply them with energy for play. When they sleep all of these activities are lessened and their bodies have a chance to rest and grow. The greatest amount of growth takes place during sleep, while the body is resting. The faster children grow the more sleep they require. Children that are accustomed to regular hours of sleep, are nervous and apt to be fretful the next day, if those hours are interrupted the previous evening for any reason.

"All babies should be put to bed at six o'clock, and left there. The older little children until of school age, should be in bed not later than seven o'clock, and left there. If this is done there will be peace and quiet in the house and incidentally, sturdier children.

"Even children of school age would be far healthier and less nervous if they went to bed early. A survey of health practices among school children in New York City revealed that 75 per cent were getting too little sleep during the school week.

"Long restful sleep is essential to the health of children. Parents should see that this is made possible."

Strike Beginning to Hurt California

California, like Oregon, is suffering the effects of the maritime strike, while the businessmen there are beginning to do considerable grumbling. E. J. McAlear, local attorney, reported on his return from Oakland this week.

In one drug store, he said, he purchased a box of razor blades and was told that these were the last blades in the store. The owner declared that his stock was decreasing to the vanishing point and could not be replenished because of the strike.

All lines of business seem to be hit in about the same manner, McAlear said, but the public has not yet been aroused to the point where a general demand for a settlement or a move to break the strike has been started.

He crossed the bay to San Francisco both by ferry and over the bridge. The ferry still operates to handle railway business and the street cars, a through fare on the street cars being sold from one city to the other, compelling the operation of the ferry.

The bridge traffic is nicely handled, he commented. The passenger cars follow the top deck of the bridge while trucks operate on the lower level. Later the street cars and railway trains will be operated also on the second level with the trucks.
