Local growers have proven that when they use certified seed from regions known to produce hardy, vigorous strains of alfalfa their chances of a satisfactory crop and stand are much greater than when uncertified seed is used.

Experience Proves

Experience Proves

Past experience on field seedings and demonstration plantings has shown that while occasional lots of uncertified alfalfa seed may occasionally prove satisfactory that it can not be definitely depended upon. Growers here generally have become converted to the idea of buying only seed that is certified. Because the probable price the coming season may be considerably higher than that of uncertified stuff there may be a tendency to buy the cheaper seed. If past experience means anything it would indicate that the purchase of the cheaper seed that is uncertified may mean that it is higher priced in the end. Experience Proves ed in the end.
