Mrs. Louisa May and Miss Hazel May of Vancouver were guests of Mr. and Mrs. C. Schindler and family during the holidays.

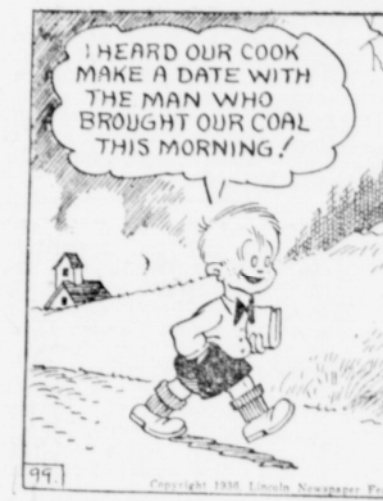

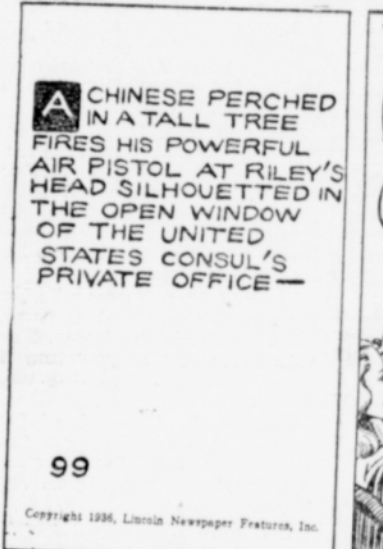

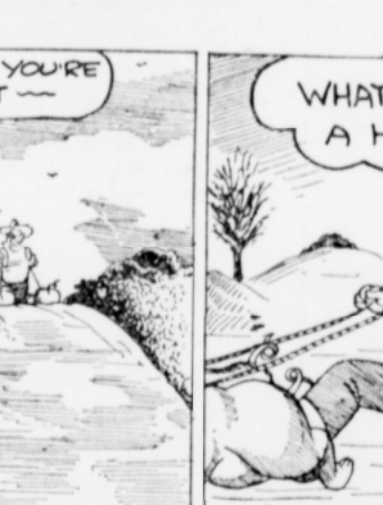
