Many Aided at County Hospital

Report of activities at the Washington county hospital for the period from May 22 to December 31, inclusive, shows 168 persons admitted, with 23 residents at the present time and 13 patients.

During this time 138 of those admitted were discharged; 10 died; three were transferred to other hospitals, and two were retained as residents.

There were 49 surgical operations performed; 63 persons were given medical treatment; 20 babies were born; 27 cases of tonsils and adenoids were operated on; four persons were isolated for contagious disease, and two were held for insanity.

During this time there were nine doctors in attendance at various times, and three called for consultation.
