Experience has revealed, it is said, that not enough use can be made of these cold storage rooms so here will be re-erected the vegetable handling machinery for next summer's work, the new freezers taking the place of the vegetable machines on the main

The new machines are of a spe-

cial make and patent, working in units. While the old type carries the containers of products to be frozen on endless belts moving slowly through intense cold cham-Change Places bers, the new units are more of the nature of a household refrigerator.


