Mrs. Amelia Greener Tober, 70, resident here for the last 27 years, died Saturday in a Hillsboro hospital of pneumonia after a brief illness. She was born November 24, 1866, in Germany and came to America 32 years ago.

Coming to this county soon after they were married, the couple settled near Buxton, where they lived until 1909 when they moved to the farm south of Hillsboro. Her husband died in 1911 and three and a half years ago she was married to Henry Tober and came to Hillsboro.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Trinity Lutheran church with Rev. George Reule officiating. Burial was in the Hillsboro cemetery.
