GUARD CHILDREN AGAINST WHOOPING COUGH

The Oregon State Board of Health has issued a warning that whooping cough or cold in a child should be regarded with suspicion. During the early stages it is extremely difficult to differentiate between the common cold and whooping cough. Moreover, it is during this early stage that whooping cough is most readily transmitted from person to person. Since over fifty per cent of the whooping cough deaths occur in children under one year of age, parents should use every precaution to protect their children against this disease.

During the month of October, 1935, six cases of whooping cough were reported in Oregon while in October, 1936, eighty-five cases were reported. Undue prevalence of the disease is regrettable when we realize that by using precaution and intelligence many of the cases would not occur.

Except for measles, there is less natural immunity against whooping cough than any other communicable disease. During infancy, whooping cough is even more dangerous than measles, children under six months of age are not apt to take measles but are highly susceptible to whooping cough.

Among precautionary measures to be considered by parents in order to protect their children against whooping cough are: (1) a child with what seems to be an ordinary cold should be kept away from others and a physician consulted to determine the true nature of illness; (2) if whooping cough develops in a community, little children should be kept at home so as to escape the dangers.

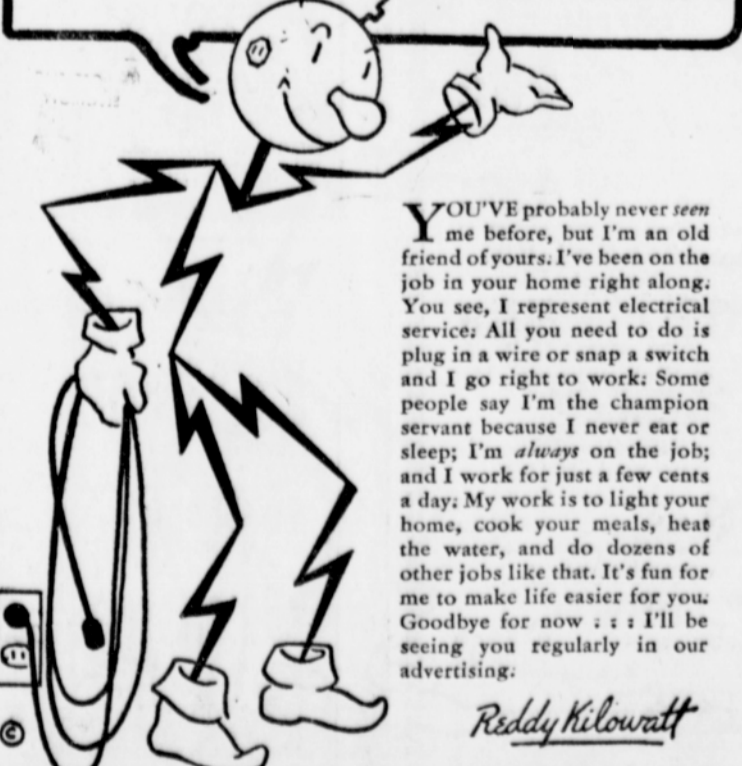

County Sheepmen Hear Veterinarian

Sanitation and successful sheep management and particularly the control of many of the common diseases and ailments of ewes and lambs, stated Dr. J. N. Shaw, veterinarian from the Oregon State college, at a meeting of sheep men which was held at the Hillsboro chamber of commerce rooms yesterday (Wednesday).

Dr. Shaw pointed out that sheep raisers too frequently follow the plan of using the better feed for the other livestock leaving only the poorer feed for the sheep with the belief that sheep are able to make use of poor feed. This opinion is erroneous, Dr. Shaw said.

Many of the difficulties at lambing time are brought about by the unsanitary condition in which the ewes are allowed to amble. Strict sanitation, clean ground and ample room to avoid crowding are all vital essentials for successful lambing.

ON OREGON FARMS "Scab" Rock Dams Considered

CONDON—The possibilities of making small water conservation dams in the "scab" rock streaks that run up through many wheat fields in the vicinity of Condon are being considered by County Agent R. M. McKennon and farmers of the district. The streaks, Mr. McKennon says, are comparatively level and have rocky bottoms, and it is believed that by damming up these streaks in a number of places a large quantity of water can be held on top of the "scab" where it can be absorbed and thereby increase wheat yields on the adjoining land. A rotary fresso and a large tractor were used in constructing some of these dams on the L. G. Parman farm. No expenditure for material is required.
