## PEP Employees Attend Meeting

Speaking on advertising and the sales efforts of PEP company, A. C. McMicken, general sales manager of the company from Portland, addressed employees of the Hillsboro division at a special meeting in the company offices here Monday night.

He outlined a new advertising campaign which the company launched Monday, featuring "Reddy Kilowatt," representation of the energy which operates all the home appliances. "Reddy Kilowatt," he said, will become familiar to all residents within the territory of the company before the campaign is completed.

McMicken told of the steady rise in the use of electricity in this territory over a period from 1926 to the present. The average amount of electricity used in 1926 was 688 kilowatts, he said, as compared to 994 in 1933. During this time the rate per kilowatt, he pointed out, has fallen from 4.13 cents in 1926 to 2.90 cents in 1936.

In 1926, McMicken said, the company sold 376 million kilowatt hours of energy while in 1936 the total was 536 million, or an increase of 42 per cent. However, he said, the increased sales have not kept pace with the increases in taxes, wages, and other expenses, with the result that the net revenue is a great deal less than in 1926.

In order to increase the amount of energy sold, the company began merchandising electrical equipment, the sales of which have been climbing steadily.

Disease control, marketing, farm legislation, breeding questions and feed resources will be the basis of consideration at the two-day meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's association next Tuesday and Wednesday on the Oregon State college campus at Corvallis. The meeting opens at 10 a. m. Tuesday, with George Fullenwider, Carlton, delivering his annual address. In the course of the first day's program Dr. B. T. Sims, I. R. Jones and J. N. Shaw will discuss sterility of dairy cattle and some of its causes and cures. The annual banquet will be held at 6:30 Tuesday.

The Wednesday session will be taken up in discussion of the 1937 soil conservation program, quality improvement and discussion of Oregon's feed resources by E. L. Potter. Also on that day there will be a discussion by L. Burlingham, manager of the National Dairy show, on the responsibility of purebred breeders to the dairy industry.

Oscar Hagg of Reedville, Washington county dairyman, heads the discussion at 3:30 the opening day of the meeting.

## Check Being Made Old Age Assistance
