First move to maintain home extension work in this county made since the county budget committee refused funds to maintain a demonstration agent here was announced this week from Corvallis with the scheduling of a training demonstration for delegates from the various clubs in the county.

The training school will be held in the WPA room at the union high school next Tuesday, beginning at 10 a. m. in charge of Eileen Purdie, acting specialist in clothing and textiles. Oregon State college, Corvallis. Subject of the meeting will be the first demonstration on garment finishes.

Under the training school plan, a project leader will be sent from each of the clubs to master the demonstration, later giving the demonstration before her club. In this manner the work can be carried on by the clubs until funds can be procured to bring another demonstration agent to the county.
