Crime Solution, Subject Before B. & P. Group

Detective Orville R. Williams of the Portland police force, expert on fingerprinting, ballistics, and handwriting, spoke on "Scientific Crime Procedure," before the Business and Professional Women's club Friday evening. He was asked by Chief Niles to take his place as he was unable to attend. Williams has been engaged in scientific work for the department for 13 years and is also a member of the Oregon bar. He cited interesting facts regarding the origin of the present fingerprinting method, the use of ballistics, the microscope and mold in crime detection, and gave an illustration of cases in which science was the contributing factor in solving crimes. He believes, however, to obtain best results, members of a police force must first have the respect and confidence of the citizens of the city or community in which they work.

As an introduction to Detective Williams' talk, Mrs. P. S. Kaagt, Business and Professional Women's Forum of Portland, presided on the work of the Forum, which is limited to forty members, who are furthering in every way the campaign for crime prevention and law enforcement. They obtain qualified speakers and contact organizations to place these speakers on their programs. She also gave an outline of interesting new methods of training child delinquents and enabling them to become good citizens.

Traffic Deaths Take Heavy Toll Parents Told

"Traffic accidents in the United States during the past 15 years have caused more deaths than were caused by all American wars which totaled a period of 15 years." This startling fact was told by John C. Kerick of the motor operators' license division of the secretary of state's office at Salem, who addressed the Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association at its meeting Monday evening in the union high school.

Mr. Kerick continued: "But we too often crowd the margin of safety. Protective measures are a matter of common sense. It was through Mrs. Paul Patterson that the P-T-A had the privilege of hearing Kerick's interesting and instructive talk."

C. H. Nosler told the association what was being done in the Hillsboro schools to teach the children "safety." He said that some of the most serious offenses are caused by children on bicycles.
