

Milk Control Upheld in Big Vote in Senate

The state senate by the overwhelming vote of 26 to 2 late Tuesday killed the bill, which would have eliminated the Oregon milk control board, a target of some Portland groups since its recent order increasing the price of milk to consumers.

The vote was taken on a report by the senate agricultural committee that the bill, introduced by Senator Lessard, "do not pass."

Senator Lessard announced that he would introduce another measure to limit the power of the milk board to fix the price received by the producer and abolishing the right to set minimum prices and quotas.

Senator McCormack, Lane county chairman of the committee, said that the committee's rejection of outright repeal of the board was based upon testimony presented by producers and distributors from all sections.

Benefits of the law were brought out by Senator E. L. Ross of this county.

Because of conditions in the mountains, logging operations are said to have been shut down awaiting warmer weather and melting of snow.
