However, the winner each year is eliminated from competition for a year following.

Other newspapers which have won the trophy twice, and which now are entitled to compete for permanent possession, are the McMinnville Telephone-Register and the River News. Should either of these win the trophy, the trophy will pass out of competition.

Sporting Offer
However, the Telephone-Register has proposed that both eligible newspapers withdraw from the competition until the Argus is again eligible to compete with them.

The Forest Grove News-Times won the coveted honor in 1934.

The Dundee plant from this section or the west part of the county, is John Thornburg, Forest Grove banker who delivered 100 tons of filberts this year. A large portion of this is from the orchards near Hillsboro and the remainder from the property above Forest Grove.

However, it is pointed out, there are a great number of orchards which will be in good production within a year or two, the volume growing as the years pass.

One objection voiced by growers here to the Dundee operations, is

the fact that cost of freighting nuts over the hills to the plant, is expensive and cuts down on the grower's profits.

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
