

Scappoose High School Withdraws from Basketball League

Action Comes After Protest; Coaches Vote

Expressing dissatisfaction with the affairs of the Washington-Columbia County Athletic association, Scappoose high school has withdrawn from the league, the officials of that school have announced.

The action was no surprise to officials of the league as the school had threatened to withdraw the previous week, it said. Scappoose gave an excuse for the move, a statement that the action was due to failure of the executive committee to replace basketball officials which the river school alleged are incompetent.

Vote of the coaches of the various other schools in the league disclosed that the protested officials were satisfactory to them. Later directors of the league voted to retain all but one of the officials, according to report.

Directors of the league, which includes eight schools from the two counties, are Jay Austin, St. Helens, president; Ira Tucker, secretary; Thomas R. Fowler, Tigar, P. M. Goodman, Hillsboro; I. R. Metzler, Beaverton, members of the board.

First half of the league schedule found Tigar and St. Helens tied for first place, each winning eight of the nine games played. Forest Grove and Vernonia were tied for third place. Final games of the first half found Tigar winning from Hillsboro 36-14; St. Helens defeating Clatskanie 37-13, and Forest Grove counting victory over Sherwood 20-13.

The main game Saturday night was between the Pacific varsity and Mt. Angel college. Mt. Angel winning 23-25. The game was brought to Hillsboro to obtain a neutral floor.

Saturday night the blue and white and Pacific university freshmen met on the Hill floor resulting in a 37-12 victory for the visitors. The locals managed to score two field goals and two free shots in the first half and three field goals in the last.

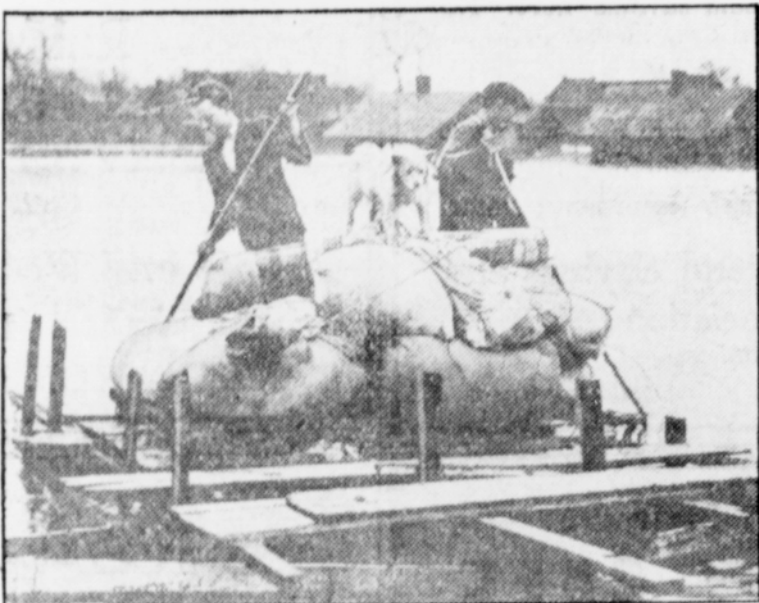

A session of the city council was on the spot in an act presented by the fire department in which the council was represented as passing an ordinance setting forth the rank and privilege of parking on Main street.
