

Portland Pair Use Farm Here to Conceal Loot

Two Washington county robberies were cleared during the week with the confessions made by Clarence Lloyd, 28, and his brother Tom, 30, Portland, who were sentenced to two years in the penitentiary from Polk county by Judge Arlie G. Walker, and a few hours later the same day to an additional four years each by the same judge from circuit court in Yamhill county.

Robberies in this county included the Aloha Pharmacy, December 20, and the Avis Crosley pool hall in Forest Grove, January 19. Loot from both places was found among a long list of articles and cash recovered at the home of R. L. Stevenson on David Hill when the officers searched the place, according to Sheriff J. W. Connell.

The pair first was arrested at Dallas when attempting to enter a hardware store there. In their car was a license plate from an automobile owned by Stevenson. Stevenson is said to be a brother-in-law of one of the Lloyds, the men taking their loot to the Stevenson farm and hiding it there.

Because of the penitentiary sentences already meted out, Washington county officials will not press charges, it is said. Early Friday morning a prowler entered the Frank Miller clothing store in Forest Grove and attempted to escape with a quantity of wearing apparel, according to a report filed with Sheriff Connell. Much of the loot, apparently, was left behind.

In the basement was a quantity of clothing, while in an alley there were three new suitcases and six boxes all carefully filled. The night marshal, Gavin Duncan, was notified of the attempted theft about 3 a. m. when a man was seen going down the alley with a suitcase. The officer saw an automobile leave the scene but was unable to catch it.

Jake Wentz, 23, was returned here Saturday by Deputy Sheriff Richard Busch from Yakima, Wash. to face a charge of auto theft from C. W. West at Tigard.

Roads, Highways Blocked by Snow

Lines Broken
Although the PEP company experienced little difficulty in the valley, two or three power lines in the hills and mountains were broken when trees, overburdened with snow, crashed across the wires. Repair crews were taken to breaks without trouble on big trucks.

The water company reported roads to the intake in the mountains blocked by more than two feet of snow. Inspections of the water supply necessarily were dispensed with until a road could be broken through.

In the more remote communities, automobiles were abandoned for horses and saddles to break through the nearly two-foot snowfall to reach supplies or call on neighbors. Mail deliveries were restricted to the main highways, while daily newspapers were not delivered in most instances until Tuesday morning.

Traffic Cut Off
Traffic on the highway between valley towns and Portland, was cut off until late Monday. Mail deliveries were curtailed from Portland to Hillsboro, while milk trucks battled for hours to reach Portland.

Bus service was at a standstill Monday, the first bus reaching Hillsboro in the evening. Tuesday morning the first bus out from Portland experienced difficulty on slippery pavements. Drifts on the Canyon road presented a considerable problem in snow removal and in many places traffic Tuesday was restricted to one-way lanes through the drifts.

By night Tuesday bus transportation was on regular schedule again. Drivers reported traffic delaying passage at a large drift near Sylvan where passenger cars seemed unable to hold the road, skidding and blocking other cars and trucks.

Among the household furnishings lost were many keepsakes belonging to Ogden, who is a past master of the Sandy Masonic lodge.
