Modern System
Among the outstanding accomplishments of this administration has been the modernizing of the water system, which replaces the water tower in vogue when he took office. Deep wells now feed a 150,000-gallon reservoir by means of pumps, which have a capacity of 500 gallons per minute.

In outlining these accomplishments, Morback points out that progress has been economical and without particular burden to the citizens of the town. At present there is owing \$14,000 in outstanding bonds, and the city operates on a cash basis.

Mayor Morback has been a resident of Sherwood for the last 48 years and is a director and organizer of the Citizens' Bank of Sherwood, an institution which this year reported excellent gains in deposits.

find themselves in a needy and destitute condition. This assistance is confined to such families as have residence in the state outside of corporate limits of cities and towns, Madden said.

Applications must be made to the local welfare office from which organization the applicants will be referred to the rehabilitation office. Grants will continue as long as need exists and funds are available.

From nine to 53 counties in each of the following states are designated as drouth areas, and migrating farm families from these areas classified as drouth refugees: Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Nebraska, Mississippi, Montana, North and South Carolina, North and South Dakota, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.
