As for the ore in the hills, Eccles said that there apparently was no data available giving any comprehensive idea as to the extent or richness of the iron deposits.

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However, he said, we have every reason to thoroughly investigate the mineral resources of Oregon as a possible outlet for surplus power to be developed at Bonneville dam.

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
