Construction New School Gym Begun

Construction of an auditorium-gymnasium to cost approximately \$13,000 was begun Tuesday at the Garden Home school by WPA workmen, according to K. E. Tillotson, resident engineer.

The new building will be 50 x 80 feet with a wing to house a stage 20 x 40 feet. The school district will furnish \$7000 in materials and the WPA \$6200 for labor costs. Clearing trees from the school yard and grading was the first work begun.

Another project scheduled to begin this week or next is clearing, excavating and draining 20 miles of county road in the vicinity of Beaverton at a cost of 12,321. Of this amount the county has agreed to spend \$1778. The project includes 8.7 acres of clearing, excavation of 9106 cubic feet of dirt, and placing 100 feet of culverts.
