Hilhi to Meet Beavers Here Friday Night

Hilhi basket tossers Friday night will have another try at the Beaverton hoopers in a game to be played on the Hilhi floor. Considering the local record and the standing of Beaverton in the league, the blue and white will have a battle on hand.

Previous score, in the game played January 21, gave the Beavers the victory 26-11.

Tuesday night, after leading St. Mary's until the last few minutes of play, a shift in the Hilhi lineup permitted St. Mary's a rally which carried that team into the winning column by a score of 28 to 21.

In the first half, St. Mary's led by one point with the tally 12-11, the lead being carried by six free throws and three field goals accomplished while Hilhi made four goals from the field and placed three out of five free throws.

In the second half the local boys scored 10 to the victor's 16. St. Mary's outdistancing them six field goals to four and sinking four out of 10 free throws.

Schulmerich Elated, Signs With Beavers

Wes Schulmerich, Hillsboro's contribution to the national pastime, baseball, appeared Thursday at headquarters of the Portland Beavers in Portland and signed his contract for the coming season in preparation for the trip south to the spring training camp.

Last year Wes played with Los Angeles and this year he declares he is willing to lay bet that his batting average will be between .325 and .340. Last year he batted .301, driving in 85 runs for the Angels.

As he signed his new contract, Wes expressed his elation by declaring that his ambition since his graduation from Oregon State in 1928 has been to play ball with the team from his own section of the coast.

Wes now is the owner of an auto and fishing camp at Beaver, in Tillamook county where he has spent the winter fixing up the place. From his exercise he points out, he has emerged with a weight of 210 pounds, which is 15 pounds under his usual weight when he reports for spring training.

Plans Made for Baseball League

First meeting of the proposed Washington county baseball league was held last Tuesday night. Dr. Abrams of Hillsboro was asked to conduct the meeting and explain the aims and purposes of this newly planned idea.

Plans are to conduct the league as a purely county league with the players picked from Washington county only. This will stop the former practice of delegating players who are paid for their services and picked from out of town. Abrams said, it will also give the local players a chance to be developed in the home community and towns that have not been financially able to import paid players an equal chance in the play of the league games.

Officials will be appointed by the head of the league to do away with home town decisions.

Teams represented were Aloha, Banks, Verboort, North Plains, Twin Oaks, Cornelius, Gaston, Hillsboro and Orenco. After the meeting the crowd was invited and treated to a "stag night" luncheon at the home of George Wick of the Chevrolet company, which offered its offices as a meeting place. Next meeting will be Tuesday night at Hillsboro.
