

# School Nurse Speaks; Student Demonstrates

Mrs. Nathan Weinstein, school nurse, who spoke to the members of the Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association Monday night, stated that character traits, personality and ideas on taste in general were developed in children by the time they were five years old, through their home environment. After that the school and the community may modify their ideas to some extent, but the greatest responsibility rests on the home.

Miss LaVelle Jackson from North Plains, a senior in the high school, discussed good taste in clothes, as taught in the domestic science department by Miss Kathryn Crozier. She stressed the suitability of the costume to the occasion, the importance of line and the value of color. She also emphasized the importance of moderation in make-up and simplicity in hair-dress and costume. In demonstrating her ideas, she used as models Dorothy Chalcombe, formal costume; Virginia Perkins, costume for a business girl; Louise Cruzen, school girl costume; Dorothy Barr, afternoon costume, and Alma Eslinger street costume, with emphasis placed on the importance of accessories.
