Marines Seek 300 for Detachments Vacancies for service with the United States Marines are now open to desirable young men, according to announcement made today by Postmaster L. T. McPheeters.

Applicants, 18 to 30 years of age and 60 to 73 inches in height, who can qualify physically and morally will be accepted to fill 300 vacancies with the Marine Detachments of the U. S. fleet and at the foreign stations manned by Marines. Qualified musicians, band leaders, former service men with aviation experience in the Army, Navy and Marine Corps for duty with aviation units will be included in the number of men accepted.

These vacancies will be filled gradually during the period until July first when the Marine Corps will reach its full strength of 17,000 men, authorized by congress. Full information may be obtained at the recruiting station, 208 U. S. court house, Portland, Oregon.
