Tribute Paid to **Debt** Adjusters

A tribute to members of the Washington County Farm Debt Ad-justment board, of which H. R. Findley is chairman, was paid by Louis N. Plamondon, chief, farm debt adjustment section, Resettle-ment administration, Membership includes; W. F. Cyrus, secretary, W. C. Christiansen, F. E. Rowell, Hills-boro; Gus Krause, Cornelius, and J. M. Vanderzanden, Banks, Assisting is Walter A. Klundt, regional debt specialist, Resettlement administra-tion, Portland

"These public spirited citizens have given many hundreds of hours of time, without pay, to help their neighbors adjust their debts and keep their farms," said Plamondon. "Cases laid before them involve distressing debt loads and almost in-sane worry. Usually the board is the last hope between the debtor and destitutio

Judgment Impartial

The county committee bu into its work along with energy into its work along with knowledge of local conditions, h continued. The debt specialist, as igned by the Resettlement admin istration as part of its nation-wid fight against farm poverty, supplies experience, knowledge of federal lending agencies, and an under-standing of legal rights of both

Each case is heard confidentially and a program made up involving extension of time, rearranged pay ment dates, increased farm income, or refinancing through some lend-ing agency. The new program is then laid before the creditors, as a suggested alternative to court ac tion. All work is advisory, since the committee has no authority to force acceptance of its proposals, but in

acceptance of its proposais, but in a surprising percetage of cases the program is accepted with out alter-ation, said Plamondon. "Foreclosure usually means one more family on the relief roll," said the debt adjustment chief. "Debt adjustment means a self-supporting. tax-paying family that can eventu-ally pay out on all debts. The local ittee is making such solutions possible and thereby contributing immeasurably to the prosperity of Washington county."
