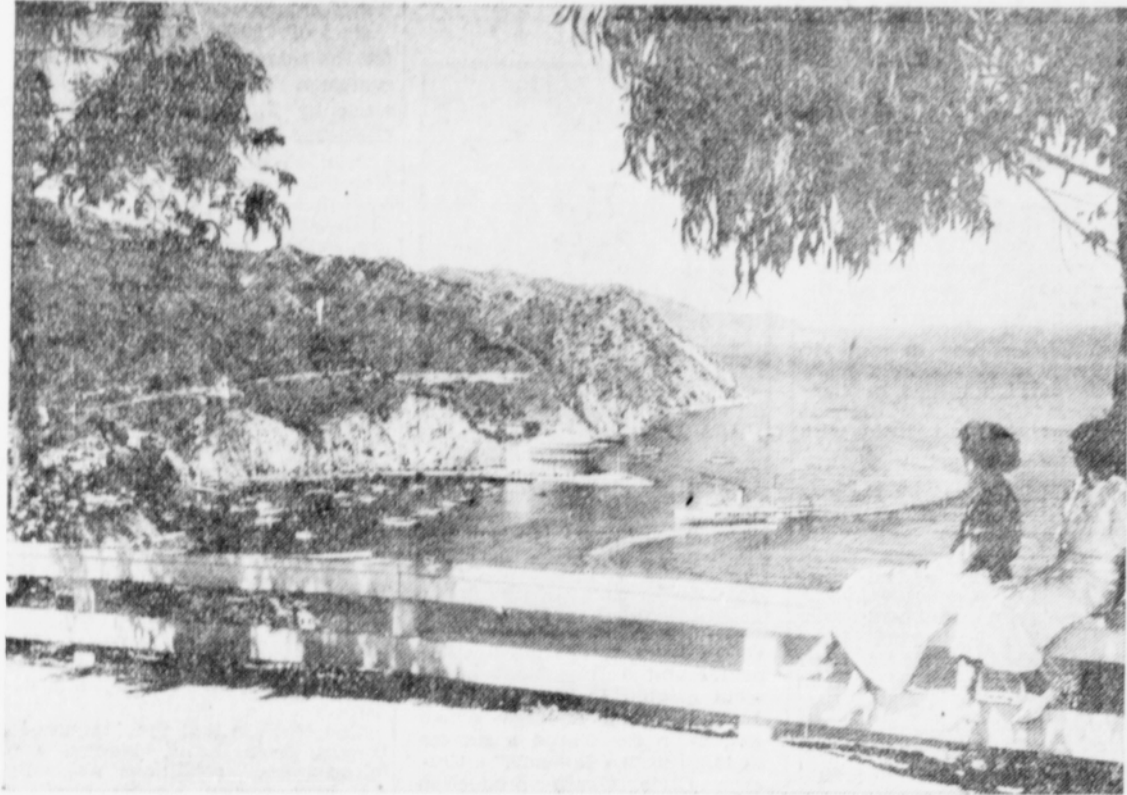
March, being a five-Tuesday month, church services have been off schedule, but beginning April 6, Rev. Cornils will preach on the first and third Tuesday nights again.

show an increase of 21 percent in the number of kilowatts used, and a 36 percent increase in gross merchandise sales.

The field of farm electrification is rapidly being expanded. Easter points out, and a number of farms in this county now are completely electrified. Irrigation, which is increasing in popularity, also is adding to the work of the rural service men. This spring a number of electric soil sterilizers are being tried by various greenhouse men with good results, it is reported.

Forest Grove Teachers Promised Salary Boost
Salary increases are in prospect for teachers in the Forest Grove Junior and union high schools. It has been announced by W. H. Artstil, superintendent. Eligibility for increases depends on attendance at summer school once each two years as well as on the number of years employed in the schools there. Under the schedule teachers will be allowed one-year leave of absence if desired. All teachers on the staff have been retained.
