**SPECIAL TREATMENT NEEDED IN PNEUMONIA**

Because of its increased prevalence at this season of the year, pneumonia frequently makes the headlines. In stressing the fact that pneumonia is the "dread disease" at the present moment, certain warnings call attention to the importance of hygienic living, prompt attention to the ubiquitous common cold, and proper care of even mild influenza are stressed. Each year slowly but steadily various factors operating in pneumonia have become known, so that there is no longer need of taking the fatalistic attitude that nature must take its course in pneumonia and the patient will either die or get well. Clinically, pneumonia may in-

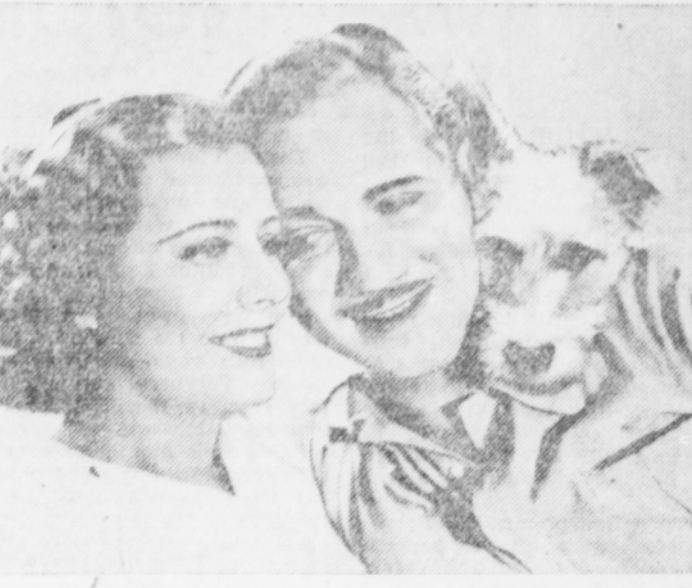
volve the upper or lower portion of one or both lungs. It may affect in one person the entire side or just one portion of it; again, the disease process may be consecutive on both sides. The physician is no longer satisfied to make a diagnosis of pneumonia but makes an examination to determine the type and it makes a great difference if the physician can say Type I, II, V, VII, or VIII. In the first place, one kind of pneumonia affects persons uniformly much less severely than other kinds or types. Furthermore, for some of the types with which we have become familiar, a specific serum has been developed which will reduce the number of deaths to a known degree.

The question naturally arises, "What is a serum? What does it do? How does it act?" The answers are not simple and undoubtedly not yet complete. The understanding of the treatment of pneumonia is based partly on fact and partly on theory. Some of the conceptions require special scientific knowledge and some are based on generally understood and accepted phenomena. No conception, however, can be separated from a consideration of the reaction of the human body. What goes on in the human body during a siege of pneumonia? For the sake of simplification we may liken an attack of pneumonia to a siege in which pneumonia germs are the besiegers, the human body the besieged, and the defenders are represented by the white blood cells. It is the duty of the white blood cells to destroy invading pneumonia-causing germs. Antibodies in the blood stream lessen the activity of attacking germs so that the white blood cells may actually destroy them.

Whether a person will survive an attack of pneumonia depends on many factors. The kind and nature of attacking germs, the resistance of the human body and the presence of antibodies in the blood stream. If the attacking pneumonia germs are Type I, II, V, VII or VIII the defenders of the human body can be increased by injecting the antibodies of the specific serum. To wage a successful fight it is necessary to determine the type or kind of attacking organisms by means of a well-established laboratory test. Successful treatment demands that the physician be called early when the patient becomes ill. In order that the serum be effective it must be given early. When symptoms are suspicious of pneumonia, the physician should be called at once.
